

# White Plague Made a National Menace

**(By Associated Press)**  
ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., June 17.—Tuberculosis must be considered not only as a deadly scourge to be feared but also as one of the greatest economic enemies, declares Walter S. Clifford of Washington, before the annual meeting of the National Tuberculosis Association here today.

In a plea for health insurance, John A. Lapp, former director of the Ohio Health Insurance Commission, pointed out that there can be no solution of the tuberculosis problem among workmen without it.

"Men cannot stop work long enough to take treatment," he says, "because as it is well known, the great mass of workmen are living only a few days or a few weeks away from what want. Some means must be devised to enable people to stop work and to receive adequate medical treatment. There are only two possible ways to do it, one through charity, the other through health insurance."

"The public attitude toward tuberculosis must be changed," said Miss Mary A. Meyers of Indianapolis, formerly the masses of people

thought the disease was hereditary and that nothing could be done about it.

Attorney Daniels will have 250 copies of Nye college, each one of whom was a member of Uncle Sam's army that helped to down the Crazy Kaiser, play a prominent part in the outdoor festival. The G. A. R. veterans as well as their brethren of the Spanish-American war will also be kept in line, while the ladies will be suitably represented by the Woman's Field Corps and Nye County Red Cross. The boy and girl scouts will muster their forces for this parade and parade Master Daniels is lining up many of the lodges and societies for a conspicuous turnout.

John Nay and Joe Scuffe, the biggest ranchers in Monitor valley, promise to stage something in the way of a real wild and wooly west show that will revive memories of the late Colonel Cody. Real Indians, bucking horses, cayuses, broncho-riders and range riders will be on the bill. As the folks from Monitor valley are known the world over for their feats of daring horsemanship, the arrangement committee is to be congratulated for their success in bringing this greatest of all kiddies' delights to Tonopah.

Senator T. J. Bell of Reese River, whose son, Elmer, made the supreme sacrifice in the late struggle, will make the patriotic address following the street parade.

A wire to Judge Grier notifying him that the California Granite company of Rockland, Calif., could not furnish a granite block of sufficient proportions by the Fourth nettled him a trifle. The judge was determined to make good on his promise to have a drilling contest. Together with L. L. Mudgett, an expert machine man, Charles Wittenberg and Billy Morris, the party drove out to the Extension mill and closely examined the huge block that was used in the drilling contests two years ago.
