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CLIPPING THE WILDCAT'S CLAWS.

OWING TO THE NUMBER of wildcat industrial and oil promotions the New York Curb Association has found it necessary to check flotation of fraudulent securities by means of a blacklist, according to a recent announcement. It was said that no particular stocks were in view but that the general Welfare Committee of the association which was recently appointed would investigate conditions carefully, and, if cause for action was found, it would advise members of the curb association to cease trading in the stocks which are placed under the ban. Furthermore a request will be made to the newspapers printing such quotations that they cease to publish prices for these stocks. It is admitted by the curb association that there have undoubtedly been instances of companies being formed with no other object than that of fleecing the public. The present plan will be to call for prospectuses or a statement from members promoting or advertising any new securities, and, if this is found satisfactory, the stock may be traded in by members of the association. On the other hand there will be a spirit of co-operation with the district attorney's office in bringing to justice fraudulent organizations.

This is the right spirit and elaboration of the plan suggested at a recent meeting of the leading interests represented by Tonopah investors who ask for nothing better than the closest scrutiny into all securities from Nevada that may be offered for listing. With the assistance of the curb association, Nevada operators stand ready to keep their lists purged and to furnish all information that will protect investors from the ravages of speculative sharks.

SETTING THEMSELVES STRAIGHT.

THE RENO SOB SQUAD of the Nevada Democratic party recently held a regular meeting where there was weeping and mourning for the departed glory of the party that Mortimer Wilson has prepared for the ceremonies of the grave. The boys held an old-fashioned wake that was filled with exordiums of the defunct. All that was lacking was the corpse which will be supplied at the proper moment when the undertaker declares the time has arrived for the final obsequies. It was a tearful scene, this solemn gathering of the clans which had shared the leaves and fishes of the regular party in politics and while each of the speakers affirmed that the late lamented looked natural there was a pallor about the features of each mourner as though they would like to have been spared the agony of testifying to the departed glories of the lost brother who had gone before. A renowned virtuoso from the far east was in attendance but his services were not wanted as the only call was for one who was capable of embalming the cadaver and putting it away where the stench would not disturb the delicate choruses of the mourning worshippers at the shrine of Democracy. There to add dignity to the occasion and to furnish the dear departed with a passport that would carry it across the political Styx, the governor himself spoke a few words that brought fresh tears to the eyes of his hearers. The proceedings were entirely informal as became the handling of a subject that was patently reminiscent until at last the remains were pitchedforked into oblivion where they will be allowed to rest until they are galvanized into action at some remote period in the future when hired spellbinders will try to conjure the corpse back to life for a third term campaign. The audience dispersed with a fervent "Rest in Peace" on the lips of the head mourners and Nevada was notified that the rank and file of the once powerful Democracy in this section finds a new Moses to lead them out of the wilderness and back to the fleshpots of Egypt.

RAH FOR WINNIPEG.

ONCE MORE the northern American continent owes its redemption to the action of service men. The latest tribute to these gallant fellows who fought from sheer force of conviction comes from the distant city of Winnipeg where the people are grateful to the boys who fought in France for the emancipation of their beloved metropolis from the greedy grasp of the Bolsheviki element which obstructed its monstrosity red hand in the peaceful affairs of a community that had always been regarded as the queen of the northwest. Yesterday's action conveys a lesson which should not be lost on the citizens of the United States in dealing ruthlessly with the evil of communism or what ever one chooses to call it, when ever the unprincipled horde raises the head of anarchy and attempts to use the torch of sedition to destroy the principles of honest government. The Dominion government, which corresponds to our federal administration, was more prompt in stamping out the insurrectionaries than our own authorities at Washington which met the encroachments of Bolshevism with a passive resistance. This fact develops through a report made an officer of the naval intelligence service five months ago. The report containing the names and antecedents of 8000 avowed I. W. W. with atrabilious tinge demanding a subversion of the republic, was carefully pigeonholed and nothing done to bring the members mentioned under the ban of the law. This report received no attention until recently when Francis P. Garvan, alien property custodian, who has been named assistant attorney general in charge of all criminal investigations, began active steps against the Nihilists. Accuracy of the statements is attested by the fact that officials of the department of justice verified every statement of the naval officer as to the character and record of ever individual named in the document.

Referring to the I. W. W. Bolsheviki proselyting the officer making the report said:

"The I. W. W. as individuals are supporting the Bolsheviki movement. They are received in Bolsheviki conventions and gatherings the same as delegates regularly elected by their respective units, and are finding their way to important committees of the Socialist party.

"Reports received of Socialist activities clearly indicate that the

transition of Socialist party branches from political Socialists to radical industrialists is proceeding rapidly. The industrialists are taking hold of the local heads of the Socialist branches and indications clearly point to the radical element using the Socialist party branches as recruiting grounds for the radical circles."

ANOTHER MEXICAN MUDDLE.

DISPATCHES ARE NOT sufficiently laud to enable the average American to pass judgment on the action of the war department in sanctioning the use of American troops on Mexican soil. There may have been some provocation or it may be a sequel to the "Get Villa Dead Or Alive" fiasco of three years ago that can only be elucidated after full information is at hand. That the Wilson administration should have turned out its army to help the treacherous old hypocrite and pro-freeman ally Carranza, is past understanding for that wretched apology for a national executive never manifested the least desire to help this country in either a political, economic or friendly way. Perhaps Mr. Baker, the pacifist secretary of war, may make it clear why he placed our troops in jeopardy on foreign soil to fight battles which brought neither glory nor conquest to our credit and it should not be forgotten that it was the Mexican war that enabled Wilson to boast that he "Kept us out of war."

BOYLE ROASTS THE DAMOCRATS

The speech of Governor Boyle at the Democratic gathering on Saturday afternoon was at once a timely reminder to the national administration that he was not a simpleton of words from Washington and also a rebuke to the such Democratic nonsense as that uttered by one Dr. Conklin, member of the party's national committee. The caliber of Conklin can be judged from his sideman statement that "Republicans have no more sense of human duty than the dog which sinks his teeth into the flesh of an innocent rabbit." To speakers who indulged in the "faughlin style" of oratory, the talk of such an unswerving Democrat as Governor Boyle must have come as a kind of bomb, the explosion of which showed to Chairman Cummins perhaps that he has been living in a fool's paradise and that the supposed unanimity of the Democratic party is a dream. Democrats are Americans and they are not to be deceived by glittering generalities any more than other Americans are.

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MILLIONS OF RATIONS ISSUED

KAPALLA, Macedonia, May 5.—(By Mail)—Millions of rations have been issued and hundreds of thousands of refugees have been fed and clothed by the American people through the Italian commission of the American Red Cross in Macedonia. In northern and southern Serbia in Rumania and in Greece proper several additional million rations have been given out without charge.

No distinction of creed or nationality has been made. Greeks, both patriarchists and Mohammedans, Slavs, including exarchists, patriarchists and Catholics, Jews of both the orthodox and Demme professions—Gypsies, Poles and Albanians, all have received aid from the American people.

In a two-month period 481,440 rations were issued at Kavalla, 339,415 pounds of food being given out. At Serres, another Macedonian town 256,675 rations were given out in one month and 6770 persons were given 10,445 garments. At Drama 3,758 persons were fed daily by average count. Tons of thousands were fed in the smaller villages in Macedonia. The total number of garments issued in Macedonia is close to a hundred thousand.

American charity in the Balkans can hardly be reckoned up in figures, now that the Balkan Commission has established headquarters at Salonki for Montenegro, Albania, Rumania, Greece and North and South Siberia. Millions of American dollars have been spent in the Balkan states in the work of relief and the work goes on.

Thousands of tons of food have been transported and issued in the starving population of Macedonia. Tons of thousands of blankets have been given away as well as mattresses, beds, coats and bolts of clothing to be made up by Turkish needle workers into clothing for Turkish women. Tons of medical supplies have been issued to hospitals and local doctors and used by American doctors and nurses.
