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PUBLICITY APPRECIATED.

WITH AN ORGANIZATION only in the tentative stage Tonopah has accomplished wonders in the way of effective and judicious advertising. While the publicity so far has not been direct advertising of the mines, prospects and promotions there has been a lot of collateral work that is well calculated to bring the best results. Appreciation of this fact is shown by the action of the Divide Allied company in coming forward with its check for a pro rata of the expenses involved by the comprehensive program mapped out by the guiding tablet engaged in advancing the material interests of the Divide. Three undertakings launched by the Chamber of Mines have served to attract universal attention for the reason that the sentiment expressed in telegrams emanating from the chamber is accepted as representing the concrete views of the camp which has never had any publicity for promotions or mines in the making. These effusions have carried the news of local confidence, unanimity of sentiment and surcharged with optimism based on facts and conditions that might never have been known had it not been for the determined action of an executive board of resolute men with minds trained in the art of truthfully submitting facts free from the taint of exaggeration and dealing with potentialities which are apparent to everybody who has taken the trouble to study the situation for himself. The Chamber of Mines has entered upon its sphere of usefulness with a deliberation that carries the conviction that the directors are on the right track and one that leads to the heart of those with money to invest and a little cultivation is bound to lead to results for which the Chamber of Mines was brought into existence.

AFFRONTING THE FRENCH.

They had to pay for every kindness they received and were it not for the activities of their own welfare workers there would not have been any escape from the bitterness that welled up in the hearts of our gallant boys over there. It is a singular coincidence, in view of yesterday's riots at Brest, that the Literary Digest should have dealt with this question at the present time is extended form by summarizing an exhaustive review of two years in France with the statement that the feelings of the doughboys could be summed up in the way they antagonized France on the occasion of their departure with the remark "Good-bye France, To Hell With You." There is no camouflage about that sentiment statement. The rank and file of the American army has had enough of France and the French people who have manifested nothing but the basest ingratitude for the services of the boys who relinquished their comfortable homes and lucrative positions for the hardships of campaigning under most distressing conditions. The glamour of fraternizing with the sons and daughters of the land that gave this country Lafayette and his fortune has been rubbed off like the trashy veneering of silvered powder leaving the bald and cold fact that the American soldier was loved more for his money than for his sacrifices in the cause of freedom. These boys return to their native land or adopted land more convinced than ever that this country has no place in settling world's affairs and that the best way for self-determination is for the American soldier to use his influence to foster the advice of George Washington for the nation to refrain individually and collectively from meddling with foreign affairs.

CHARLES STENINGER, AN ELKO PIONEER IS DEAD

Charles E. (Chick) Steninger, a pioneer of Elko county, died at Elko Friday. He suffered a stroke of apoplexy, from which he became paralyzed from the shoulders down, last Saturday night while at the Dwyne Indian reservation. He was in his usual health when he retired on Saturday night, and was found lying in the bed in a helpless condition on Sunday morning.

He was 45 years old, having been born at Wellman, Ia., July 3, 1873, where his boyhood days were mostly spent. When the Spanish-American war broke out he enlisted in the 52nd Iowa volunteers, and was among the first troops to be sent to the Philippines, where he served for some time before being invalided home with fever.

Mr. Steninger was one of the best known citizens of eastern Nevada, having come to the state in 1902, first stopping at Wells, then coming on to Elko, where he has since made his home.
