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FREE CAMPING A LAKE TAHOE

(Correspondence of Associated Press) SACRAMENTO, Cal., June 5.—A free camping ground on the shore of Lake Tahoe in the Sierra Nevada mountains, being prepared by the state, will be ready for use by the public before July 15, it was announced today by George Neale, deputy fish and game commissioner for the northern district of California. Camping sites that will accommodate eighty-three parties at one time, have been laid out on the site of the old state fish hatchery, a short distance from Tahoe City.

Drinking fountains have been installed and water will be accessible to each lot for cooking purposes. Before next summer the commission hopes to have shower baths installed for the convenience of the campers. A platform for bathers has been built on the edge of the lake. A complete sewage system and garbage incinerator have been installed.

The tract of thirteen acres owned by the state has a frontage on the lake and the state highway parallels the back line of the property. The number of camping sites will be moved to a new site purchased by the state. This is said to be the only free camping ground on the lake shore. While automobile owners are expected to patronize the camp in large numbers, the commission has emphasized that the camp will be open to all who desire to use it. A superintendent will be in charge to make assignments to camp sites.

Among the rules and regulations is a provision that the time of the camping period will be governed by the demand. It will be limited to fourteen days or at the discretion of the superintendent, the regulations say.

The site is dotted with trees and there are wild currants, gooseberries and blueberries on the property, Neale said.

U. S. POLICEMEN TO TRACE CRIME

(Correspondence of Associated Press) LOS ANGELES, June 5.—A national police force, operated as a separate and distinctive branch of the federal government, possessed with funds sufficient to prosecute the most relentless investigations and removed from the realm of politics, is the opinion of John L. Butler, chief of police of Los Angeles, who has just returned from a conference of Pacific coast chiefs of police at San Francisco, where the looming menace of anarchy was discussed.

"This national police department should be strong enough numerically to cope with any situation, backed with a sufficient appropriation to undertake a determined campaign against destructionists and should be empowered by national legislation to call upon, and if necessary to direct the activities of any local authority," declared Chief Butler.

"The national police force, which the best informed police officials now favor, should be directed by experienced detectives, not politicians. It should never be used for political purposes nor for or against labor or capital, and should never become involved in their differences. The organization should be one to which could be reported for proper inquiry any suspicious acts of persons coming to the notice of city, county or state authorities, civic organizations or individuals; in other words, it should be a centralized clearing house for data for the protection of our people and industries against anarchy or radicalism."

BLOODY SCOURGING OF THE BOLSHEVIKI

(Correspondence Associated Press) BIELEBEL, European Russia, May 10 (via Vladivostok, June 2).—The reign of the Bolsheviki passed over the people of Bielebel like a scourge. The Bolsheviki occupied Bielebel for several months.

The correspondent of The Associated Press visited the town within a fortnight after their evacuation. The people were just beginning to wad up their domestic and governmental affairs. Refugees were returning to view the wreck of their homes. They were veritable wrecks for the Bolsheviki had occupied all vacated houses and had carried away or destroyed most of their contents.

Many persons had disappeared and it was well known that many had been murdered. The corpses of victims are being discovered. The correspondent followed a stream of men, women and children which flowed out across the fields toward the center of a scrubby wood. There under the overhanging bank on the edge of a gravel pit they were lying in a heaped-up mass of bodies, apparently they fell or had been thrown with an attempt at burial.

The bodies were mostly those of young or middle-aged workmen. They each the boots and most of the outer clothing had been removed or some the skulls were crushed or other the faces were disfigured as though by gunshot at close range.

The crowd on the bank above the gruesome pile appeared fascinated. They silently made way for a group of Americans, including Consul Fisher, from Omsk, and two correspondents and watched with interest while they photographed the victims.

A newly dressed woman and a girl walked into the pit to get a better look at the figure of a blonde young girl which lay partly uncovered close under the bank.

The body was perfectly preserved by the cold and lay with arms bare and crossed as though the victim had been sleeping. The face

which was not disfigured, was that of an intelligent, pretty girl. Her dark the body was removed from the street, who had come from the town who had been abducted by the Bolsheviki commissar when she was evacuated. Close by was the body of another woman.

High school boys and girls and priests were compelled to clean the streets. Women of the "Intelligent 25" were made to clean the floors and walls of barracks occupied by Bolsheviki troops.

MOVIES PLAYING PART IN REFORM

(Associated Press) LOS ANGELES, July 2.—The picture will play a leading part in the rehabilitation of Russia and will be a factor in the downfall of the Bolsheviki rule in that country, according to M. Gennary Mikolodovitch Borsenyeff, president of the Sincere-Seeve, a cooperative credit system claimed to be the largest in the world.

M. Borsenyeff, who recently arrived from Siberia, visited one of the leading moving picture establishments of southern California in company with Howard D. Hallett, an American consul in Russia, for the past two years, with a view to plans for the education of Russia by the cinematograph. The cooperation of the picture concern was pledged to any effort the United States government, which Consul Hallett is representing, might put forth to aid Russia.

The party, which includes Mrs. Borsenyeff, left for New York to confer with manufacturers. They will proceed from there to London.
