"Destroyers roll and toss to such an extent," said Lieutenant Blumenkranz, "that it is largely a diet of cold sandwiches that one follows in rough weather. If the seas permit one has coffee, because the coffee cups are fastened to the ship, and the greatest amount of liquid which will not be spilled when the ship rolls is brewed."

"As for warm food, however, one cannot keep it on the stove long enough to cook it, or the stove long enough to eat it hot in the case of those making five trips on a stomach long enough to digest it."
