## KEEP RYE FLOUR OUT OF EUROPE

(Correspondence Associated Press) CHICAGO, Aug. 29.—To a great extent, feeding the eyes instead of the stomach is responsible for the high cost of living, according to authorities here in the milling and grain trade. They cite the fact that rye flour is 42.25 a barrel cheaper than white flour although, except for looks, the rye flour is usually good or better as food.

Unusual cheapness of rye flour at this time is ascribed to two causes—the stoppage of wheat distilling and the substitution of white bread for rye bread as a rule.

It is said also by the milling experts that so far as known here the United States government is purchasing only white flour for shipment to Europe notwithstanding that the bulk of the population across the Atlantic is far more accustomed to rye bread than white.

## MYSTERY OF RED MURMAN CHIEF

(Correspondence Associated Press) MEDVEHA GORA, Russian Lapland July 6. Legends are springing up among the peasants in the territory about the Murmanskiy railway front, where American railway troops assisted the Russo-Allyed forces against the Bolsheviks, about the personality of a Bolshevik chieftain known as Spiridonoff.

Like the notorious "Maxo," a daring Bolshevik bandit whose name has become widespread in the Ukraine, Spiridonoff has never been seen by any of the Allied forces, though captured documents and overheard telephone conversations between Red Army commanders, convince the Allies that Spiridonoff exists.

One of the stories about him is that as a Bolshevik commander of operations on the Murmanskiy front, he has been twice wounded, but now rumors are being carried to the front in a chain line which he directs from his headquarters. From peasant lips it is learned that he is a cunning, ruthless person, dealing with those who oppose him.

## BAD REMEDIES CAUSE ARREST

(Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Aug. 28.—Four hundred and fifty seizures of so-called remedies for social diseases have been made recently under the food and drug act by federal officials who have inaugurated a campaign to suppress this variety of "quack" medicine. In making this announcement today the bureau of chemistry of the department of agriculture issued a general warning that use of such "remedies" was extremely dangerous and likely to lead to a long period of suffering.

"The goods seized include a great variety of compounds," said the bureau's announcement. "Some of the labels bear the claim of the manufacturer that the contents are sure cures. Some even contain statements that use of such 'remedies' was extremely dangerous and likely to lead to a long period of suffering."

"In all the seizure actions the government alleged the preparations to be falsely and fraudulently labeled. Such preparations are sold largely because of plainness but false claims regarding their curative effect. Many sufferers are led to believe that cures will be effected by these preparations, and appropriate treatment under competent medical supervision is neglected or permanent injury to health and even danger to life has resulted."

**PIOCHE MAN SUES MINE COMPANY FOR DAMAGES**

Charging that the Amalgamated Pioche Mines and Smelter corporation violated the terms of an agreement which it made to give him a lease on ground which it owns, Tom McCormac of Pioche has filed suit in the federal court demanding a judgment for damages amounting to \$13,000.

## VETERANS BURY RACE ANIMOSITY

(Correspondence of Associated Press) TAHITI, Papeete, July 1.—Traditional South Sea hospitality and a bond between Papeete veterans of the world war and their cousins, Papuans from the island of New Caledonia, when a steamer recently brought the soldiers home from Europe.

Resentment engendered while the Tahitians were training at Noumea, capital of New Caledonia, in 1914, threatened an eruption when New Caledonians should land on the shores of Papeete. It was typical of the islanders however, that when the troop ship El Kantara slipped anchor, the Tahitians should greet their erstwhile enemies and welcome them to the festival prepared for their home coming.

Officers had a great difficulty in rounding up New Caledonian soldiers who had gone inland because they would be forgotten and left behind. A few 100,000 glided their feet and still are on the island.
