## THREE SUNDAYS EVERY WEEK IN BOSNIAN CITY

(Correspondence of Associated Press)  
SARAJEVO, Bosnia, Oct. 2.—Sun-  
day is observed three times a week  
here.

Because there are 25,000 Turks in  
the city, Friday is the first Sunday.  
Then all the Turkish stores close  
and one goes twice a day to some  
of the hundred mosques whose slender  
minarets gleam white against  
the green background of the hills.

Because two hundred years ago a  
group of Spanish Jews settled in  
Bosnia, Saturday is Sunday for many  
Sarajevans. Then all the Jewish  
stores are closed and the Jews of  
the city crowd the big yellow syna-  
gogue of the main street.

Because all the rest of the 54,000  
inhabitants of Sarajevo and hun-  
dreds of peasants from the hills  
around are Serbs and Bosnians, fol-  
lowing both the Roman Catholic and  
Greek Orthodox beliefs the Sunday  
Sabbath is the biggest holy day of  
all in Sarajevo. All the stores ex-  
cept the Turkish are closed. The  
churches are crowded with people  
dressed in every style from the lat-  
est Belgrade fashions to Bosnian  
ironers for both men and women,  
with huge bearded shavers and woolen  
barbours. After that modern Sara-  
jevo walks about the modern quar-  
ters and old-fashioned Sarajevo  
dances the "Kolo" in the big square  
of the crowded Turkish bazaar.

The results of three Sundays a  
week for the people here is no Sun-  
day at all for the Americans, who  
do not stay without some school or  
hospital that must be provided for.  
Lieutenant John B. Hartman, of  
the 38th Infantry, Lieutenant Har-  
man is in charge of the medical sup-  
plies from America which have made  
the hospital possible.

##### HIGH GRADE SILVER MINED FROM COALDALE PROPERTY

Business on the Native Silver Min-  
ing company's holdings between  
Coaldale and the old camp of Colum-  
bus are about ready to make a ship-  
ment which will probably go to the  
Kennett smelter. Several tons are  
on the dump. This will run at the  
rate of \$75 to \$100 a ton. The towers  
are planned to place the mine in  
most working shape after the long  
time it remained without action.  
Judge E. M. Hays is one of the  
principal stockholders and local rep-  
resentative of the company.

#### REDUCTIONS FOR BANKS OF WHITE PINE COUNTY

San Belford, appearing for the  
Copper City National bank of East  
Ely and the McGill National bank  
of McGill, asked for a reduction in  
the assessed valuations of the banks  
named. He stated that owing to  
strike conditions the banks repre-  
sented by him as well as the two  
banks at Ely had been obliged to  
call in their loans and make pre-  
parations for any emergencies that  
might arise, hence had been unable  
to make any money for several  
months and probably would be in  
like condition for some time to  
come. The commission gave the  
matter immediate consideration and  
ordered a 25 per cent reduction of  
the values placed on all White  
Pine county banks at the board's  
meeting last August.—Carson News.
