### RIGID RETRENCHMENT THROUGHOUT JAPAN

(Correspondence of Associated Press)

TOKIO, Oct. 16.—The government has abolished first class cars on all railroads except for long distance journeys. The railroad officials have been shorn of their brilliant gold braided uniforms and swords. All this is a movement in the democratizing of life and the abolishment of special privileges.

According to the newspapers, Premier Hara requested a first class car to go to meet Baron Makino who was returning from Paris, but the railroad refused the request.

### BRAZIL BUYING FREELY GOODS FROM AMERICA

(Correspondence of Associated Press)

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil, Sept. 10.—Imports into Brazil from the United States in the first six months of 1919 were four times greater than those from Great Britain, the nearest competing country, according to the American chamber of commerce for Brazil.

Total imports were \$168,749,759. Of this amount, \$89,727,250 came from the United States and \$22,983,250 from Great Britain.

Brazil's exports for the same period totaled \$271,304,000, of which the United States took products valued at \$92,890,250. France was the next heaviest purchaser, with \$77,161,250, while Great Britain was third, with \$21,556,500.

Coffee was by far the most important product contributing to the favorable trade balance of over \$100,000,000 as 7,425,000 bags valued at \$164,380,250 were reported.

### HARDSHIPS IN A GOOD CAUSE

(Correspondence of Associated Press)

ALEXANDROPOL, Armenia, Sept. 22.—Via Paris, Oct. 3.—Miss Ruth Stuart, formerly of the Children's hospital, Boston, and the Sionne hospital, New York, now a member of the American Red Cross, has arrived here from Tiflis, after traveling three days and nights in a box car, with a bag containing 1,000,000 rubles for the use of the American hospital and orphanage in this city.

In the Transcaucasus, which is without police, money is usually brought from Tiflis by a corporal's guard, but as funds were urgently required and no guards were available, the bank decided to entrust the money to the good sense of the American nurse. She left without a soldier convoy and unarmed.

As the train left Tiflis the nurse was handed a sack containing a bushel of the tripartite (of Armenia, Georgia and Azerbaijan). As soon as the train was en route Miss Stuart emptied her personal effects from her suitcase and repacked it with the money. She placed the sack under the blanket on her bed and sat upon it, beginning her watch of seventy-two hours.

At Megaidi, three men entered her car. They made signs that they were customs inspectors and must search her for contraband. Miss Stuart knew that the cars of foreign missions are not subject to search by the Georgian government, but she said nothing and did not leave her seat. The alleged inspectors searched thoroughly, seemed puzzled, and left.

Outside Karaklis three horsemen in the uniforms of Cossacks, 250 looted out of a wood trunk at the train. Party-shots were exchanged between riders and passengers, none taking effect. The riders attempted to overtake the locomotive, which was slowly making a grade, but were stopped by a deep gully. During the encounter Miss Stuart did not look out of the car. She sat on the million rubles.


