STRONGHOLD OF THE REDS.

A trenchant indictment of the democratic administration is found by reading the reports of the investigation into the conduct of the department of labor with its branch at Ellis Island where the alien enemies and budding bolsheviks of the nation were centered for the purpose of deportation. The island has been shown up as the rendezvous of free lovers, radicals and the off-scourings of creation, embracing everything bad that could be mustered under the sun, with the sanction of the United States government. Here was found an official who was so thoroughly centered in self-importance that he refused to obey the mandates of the courts ordering immediate removal of scores of dangerous characters far beyond the confines of this country. In a few cases where an apparent compliance with orders for deportation was manifested, criminals were given the liberty of choosing their own destination without regard to where they originated. It is with this nest of anarchists that Dudley Field Malone, erstwhile collector of the port of New York, essayed to pose as a monitor and mouthpiece of the administration. Mr. Malone will be remembered as the exponent of "He Kept 'em Out of War" idea and the man who was chosen to harass the delegation of republican ladies who were traveling the continent under the leadership of Mrs. Shaughnessy, wife of the ex-charge d'affaires in Mexico. The treatment accorded these ladies in Reno was largely actuated by the Malone cabal which at that time was low high with the administration. Again Mr. Malone was entrusted with looking after the campaign in Nevada to see that the state was enrolled in the democratic column. How well he succeeded with the compleity of minions of the party leaders in Washington may be guessed after glancing at the returns. Part of Mr. Malone's mission to Nevada was to stir up race hatred which he exploited to a disgusting degree from the platform in Reno. Mr. Malone is a type of the partisans whose chief mission was to disrupt the republican party by disseminating all sorts of stories regarding the republican candidate for the presidency. The same tactics were pursued in California with the result that Mr. Hughes was rendered unpopular in circles controlled by the Johnson faction. Malone was chosen to wash the dirty linen of the Wilson following and it will not cause any regret in Nevada to learn that he is now utterly discredited by the men in whose behalf he pledged the support of the Irish Americans of the west. He earned his reward and stands repudiated without a good word from his former political allies.

LET THEM DIE.

The state of Washington knows better how to deal with the I. W. W. element than any other state that has attempted to grapple with the problem. Even the national administration can take an object lesson from what they are doing in Seattle and Tacoma, where the reds did not hesitate at adding assassination to their favorite occupation of hurling bombs at innocent paraders. The wobbles organized a hunger strike as a protest against their incarceration. The authorities did not waste any time or thought in devising measures to bring the recalcitrants to their normal senses, but simply let them do as they pleased. No forcible feeding was ordered, but on the contrary, the rebellious prisoners were notified that they were at liberty to starve as long as they felt disposed to punish themselves. The longer they pursued their favorite tactics the better, for it implied that eventually the reds would save the state from the trouble and expense of several executions or protracted legal proceedings. That is the right way to deal with such revolutionaries who recognize no laws except those to which they may appeal to save their necks from jeopardy. Contrast this practice in the state of Washington with the methods applied on Ellis Island where forcible feeding and other means were adopted to divert them from their suicidal tendency. Then all hail to Washington, the state so well named for the father of the nation which never contemplated harboring assassins or their confederates under the grand old banner which led the way through France and Belgium as the flag of freemen.

COWARDICE OF WILSON.

Just for the reason that Gen. Leonard Wood was a friend and chum of the late Theodore Roosevelt the Wilson administration early in the war resolved not to give him a chance to win any laurels overseas and therefore assigned him to the charge of a training camp where it was believed his talents would be immured. Having reached the point of debarkation with his division, trained to the minute, General Wood was confronted with an order assigning him to another training camp back in the western wilds where he would be lost in obscurity. With the coming of the steel strike General Wood was ordered to Gary, Ind., where it was cunningly supposed his administration of martial law would antagonize the strikers and thus raise up an army of enemies against the general in the ranks of organized labor. The opposite result was achieved for the delicate duty was handled with such tact that General Wood won over the strikers and evoked praise of the Steel corporation for his unflinching adherence to duty. The strikers found the general was a strict disciplinarian who laid down the laws as he knew them and played no favorites. Instead of incurring the animosity of the steel workers, General Wood earned their admiration and was rewarded with a testimonial urging him not to remove the regulars from control of the Gary situation. The same discrimination was displayed as soon as the coal strike dawned until it was found that the more difficult and perplexing were the duties assigned him they were an open book to the running mate of Roosevelt who made friends where the swivel chair heroes at Washington, acting as toadies of the administration, thought his death knell would be sounded. Every effort of an evil minded satrapy has been directed to diminish the luster of the genius whose name has been chosen by a strong element of the republican party to lead their electors in the forthcoming campaign. General Wood has not been heard from, but if it should so happen that he become the nominee of the republicans, the United States would have the advantage of a president who would not falter or retreat when confronted with international entanglements. He would not be

the man to capture Vera Cruz with the notice that the Mexicans must first salute the American flag before it was lowered by the expeditionary force. Neither would General Wood issue an order to bring "Villas dead or alive" and then recant his order when the hard riders of the United States cavalry were on the point of capturing the bragging bandit. There may be men better qualified than General Wood to lead the republican voters to victory, but the general will be found as good a citizen as he is a soldier to defer to the voice of his party.

BERLIN REDS WITHOUT CHIEF

(Correspondence of Associated Press) BERLIN, Nov. 13.—The death of Hugo Haase, president of the independent socialist party, leaves that party apparently without a leader of sufficient caliber to prevent it from being engulfed by the German bolsheviks. Haase died from wounds received October 8 when he was shot three times by an Austrian as he was entering the reichstag building.

Recent events have indicated that Haase had been unable to halt the stampede of the followers to the extreme left of radicalism. The authority he once wielded in the independent party had been undermined by radicals, such as Daeumling, Ledebour, Richard Mueller, Eichhorn, Cleyer of Saxony and Henke of Bremen, all desperate opponents to the parliamentary government, without which Haase finally came to believe government in Germany would be impossible.

It is expected that Haase's death will hasten a split in the independent socialist party and a union of its more moderate elements with the majority socialists, headed by Philip Scheidemann. Indications are seen of a complete radicalization of the major portion of the independent portion of the independent party after the Russian pattern. The independents now are dominated by a dozen men who are regarded as expert

(Correspondence of Associated Press) MEXICO CITY, Nov. 17.—Automobiles, motorcycles and other gasoline driven vehicles have not deposed the pedestrian bicycle as the most popular means of locomotion in Mexico City. Business men use them to go to work, government employees bowl along on them by the score, school children prefer them to street cars and the omnibuses. The old-time bicycle club of twenty years ago flourishes here and it is no uncommon sight to see a party of men and women in the conventional riding garb taking a spin over the well paved streets of the capital.

Numerous laws have been passed regulating the use of bicycles. They must be equipped with front and rear lights of a designated color, brakes, horns and whistles. Some of the more fancy ones bear flags, coats of arms and a holder for the inevitable walking stick affected by every real gentleman in the capital. It is not uncommon to see a bicycle carrying at least twice its original cost in equipment.

But with bicycles as with automobiles there is no speed limit. Bicycle riders and their dare-devil companions, the drivers of the automobile buses, continue to be the terror of pedestrians.
