WIDOW OF WAR BECOMES BRIDE

(Correspondence of Associated Press) LONDON, Nov. 18.—The engagement of Mrs. Pamela Congreve, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Cyril Maude, to Major the Hon. William Fraser, has just been announced. Mrs. Congreve is the widow of Captain William L. Congreve, the only son of Sir Walter and Lady Congreve, who was killed in the war after winning the Victoria Cross and the Distinguished Service Order and the Military Cross.

Mrs. Congreve was a war bride. In less than two months after her marriage, she became a widow. King George and Queen Mary showed their sympathy for her in characteristic fashion. They received her privately at Buckingham palace where she received the orders that her gallant husband had won. Queen Mary acted as godmother for the baby girl that was born the following spring.

Major Fraser to whom she is now engaged, was best man at her first wedding, and is the son of Lord and Lady Saltoun.

Mr. and Mrs. Maude, Mrs. Congreve's parents, are well known in America where both are stage favorites and where they have a wide social acquaintance.

MAP DESIGNED FOR THE USE OF ALL AIR PILOTS

(Correspondence Associated Press) SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 3.—Elyers in the proposed 1920 world-girdling air derby will not travel by Mercator's projection but by a new "butterfly" map devised by B. J. S. Cahill, of Oakland, Calif., which has just been adopted by Major Charles J. Glidden, executive secretary of the Aerial Derby commission, now on his way to the far east and who gave the map his approval before leaving here.

Mr. Cahill, who is the originator of San Francisco's \$12,000,000 "civic center" plan, said that an aviator using the Mercator projection as a guide, would go 1,000 miles out of his way in a trip from Panama to Yokohama. "If the north pole were on an island a mile wide," he said, "it would appear on Mercator's projection to be 25,000 miles wide, or nearly the total circumference of the earth at the equator."

The inventor of the new map, who worked on his drawings fifteen years, said that "an impartial and rational world geography is essential to world peace." He said that Mercator's projection which was originally devised by the Belgian cartographer as a guide for navigators, "distorted and exaggerated the earth as it receded from the equator." This, for instance, made it appear as if South America were much smaller than North America when, as a matter of fact, he said, they were about the same area.

The Cahill map is as though an actual sphere had been cut and flattened, its appearance somewhat resembling the outspread wings of a butterfly.

A nation looking unduly expanded on the map may easily, Mr. Cahill says, develop a sort of geographical "big headedness," inducing an overbearing diplomacy. A nation whose territory is so unduly exaggerated on the maps in common use may well come to exaggerate its resources, its economic strength and even its virtues and so created an atmosphere anything but conducive to mutual good will and consequent world peace.

All problems of intercommunication by sea, land or air are baffling and misleading on Mercator's chart, says Mr. Cahill, but simple and obvious on the "butterfly" map, a further aid to mutual knowledge and understanding.

"Internationalism, now a sporadic and occasional thing, but destined in the future to be the keynote of all human endeavor, plays an important part in the science of statistics and meteorology," said Mr. Cahill. "Graphical statistics are self-contradictory and ludicrous on Mercator's chart and as for indicating the progress of high and low pressure rings

In weather charts, the ever changing scale on Mercator's was simply bewildering to the forecaster who had to use them. The new map, by showing all lands in their true proportion and form, he declares, would help materially in solving peacefully problems dealing with the world as a whole.

(Correspondence Associated Press) MEXICO CITY, Nov. 18.—American capitalists are reported to have invested heavily in mining property in the northern part of the republic, the largest single deal having been made by an American smelting and refining company for controlling interest in the Rosita coal mines in Coahuila for which a million and one-half pesos were paid. The Rosita fields in the past have furnished the greater part of the coal supply of the country and the new owners are said to contemplate enlarging the field and placing Coahuila coal on the United States market.

AMERICAN FLAG IS IN RIO JANEIRO

(Correspondence of Associated Press) RIO DE JANEIRO, Nov. 11.—Great increase in the number of American vessels plying between United States and Brazil ports was shown when, in October, thirty-three vessels flying the American flag entered the port of Rio de Janeiro. Statistics show that during the entire year of 1914 only twenty-six vessels arrived in Rio.

POLICE ACT AS CENSORS

(Correspondence Associated Press) RIO DE JANEIRO, Nov. 11.—Moving pictures exhibited in this city hereafter must be approved by a police censor. A circular was sent to all moving picture companies today warning them not to exhibit films not previously passed by the police authorities.

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The Darms Coal Company owns 160 acres of patented land and 800 acres of land adjoining—subject to patent, near Coaldale, Esmeralda County, Nevada. The first prospecting on the ground was done by sinking an incline shaft on a vein which showed a large outcrop of low-grade coal. At a depth of 200 feet, the coal gave 28 per cent ash, by Government test, and at 280 feet the vein was 21 feet thick and six feet of it gave 15 per cent ash proved to be commercial coal. By crosscutting 40 feet, another vein was cut that showed three feet of good coal.

It was not feasible to mine this coal through the prospect shaft, and in consideration of the improvement in the quality as depths were attained, engineers recommended a new shaft, which has been sunk to a depth of 540 feet. A contract has been let to Fallel & Mulloy to sink an additional 80 feet, which, according to surveys, would bring the shaft about 30 feet below the big vein.
