JAPANESE DRAMA WITH AMERICAN CHARACTERS

(Correspondence Associated Press) TORIO, Nov. 12.—A famous Japanese actor, Koshiro, played the role of Townsend Harris, the first American minister to Japan, in a play presented in the Japanese language in the Imperial Japanese theatre the other day. Koshiro gave a faithful portrayal of America's first diplomat to Japan, having borrowed a portrait of Mr. Harris from the Am-

erican embassy, through the kindness of Roland S. Morris. The play was called "America-no-Benkei" or "The American Messenger" and was written by Okamoto Kido. The gate in the Azabu temple in Tokio which housed the first diplomatic mission from the United States, was in the foreground of the first scene of the play. Two samurai, father and son, are on guard to protect Harris from attack. Suspicious characters lurk around ready at the first opportunity to assassinate the stranger from overseas. One of them is caught by the samurai and bound, but at Harris' request is set free. Koshiro's entrance by the temple gate, carrying the Stars and Stripes over his arm, was impressive.

The great topic of the day was whether Japan would open a port to foreign trade and conservatives clashed with progressives on this point. This was shown in a scene in a tea house in which a serving maid overhears a plot of two ruffians, who are to lay in wait for the minister on a nearby hill and kill him. One scene is laid at the approach to the bridge near the great temple of Sogan where the minister was attended by an escort of samurai just as they reach the place of ambush the tea house maid rushes to the rescue, stops the ruffians and delivers information about the plot. Before long the two parties are engaged in a hand to hand fight. Townsend Harris in his white dress coat emerges from his palanquin pistol in hand. The escort enters the scene before he is allowed to use his pistol. One of the protecting samurai, who is the lover of the tea-house maid, claims. In the final scene Harris is shown placing a banner of white lilies on the coffin of the slain young samurai.

FAIR PRICE FOR GOOD CLOTHING

(Correspondence Associated Press) CHICAGO, Dec. 12.—Twenty-four dollars and a half is a "fair price" for a man's suit or overcoat, the federal price-regulating commission, working under direction of District Attorney Clynne announced today.

A fair price for women's suits was fixed at \$25, women's dresses, \$15.25; men's shoes, \$5.95, and women's shoes, \$4.50. Officials of five of Chicago's biggest retail stores prepared the price list, which follows:

The first effect of the fair price list will be to bring about a drastic decrease in the price of suits, overcoats, hats, shoes and all other staple articles of clothing, the committee declared.

SALMON FOUND WITH TWO MOUTHS

(By Associated Press) PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 15.—A salmon, with two complete mouths was recently taken from the Columbia river near here, by fishermen. The freak was not discovered until it reached a local market. Injury when young is said to have caused the growth of the under jaw, which is filled with teeth.

The fish, a silverside salmon, weighed ten pounds. Careful examination revealed that the Y-shaped cartilage which supports the atypical jaw had been wrenched loose from the lower jaw, probably when the fish was a fingerling, and had healed perfectly, leaving the fish the semblance of two lower jaws. Nothing similar had ever been seen here among the hundreds of thousands of tons of salmon handled annually.

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
