CAHILL LEDGE GOES 3 MILES

When Jack Cahill made his discovery of gold in the hills on the eastern slope of the Toiyabe range, where the granite of the mountains and the lime stone of Smoky valley come in contact, he started something which promises to do a great deal more than make him rich. The great contact lode on which he made his discovery will be known as the Cahill lode and as it appears at this time, is destined to become world famous as a producer of gold and silver, and to continue producing the precious metals long after the present generation is forgotten.
Among those who came to the first rush was Mark Leffler, an experienced prospector and miner from Montana. Having a long distance to come after he heard of the strike, he arrived too late to get any desirable ground near the original locations.
Mr. Leffler is a very quiet man, and accustomed to the solitude of the hills, and when he found what he thought was a good place to dig, laid in a supply of powder and provisions and began running a tunnel to tap the gold at a depth of about fifty feet. He kept steadily at work, said nothing about his prospect, and when his tunnel had reached a point about seventy feet in, took a sample across his veta, which is three feet wide, and the return from the assay shows \$36 in gold and two ounces in silver to the ton.
While the assay, by itself, is nothing to become excited over, the fact that it is undoubtedly on the Cahill lode, and that the surroundings are almost if not quite identical with those at the Birch Creek showing, is proof beyond a doubt that the big lode extends along the foothills for at least three miles, and that anywhere along this strip of ground a little scientific digging is more than likely to uncover as good or a better showing than even the Cahill discovery.—Reese River Reveller.

WOMEN RANK THRIFT NEXT TO AMERICANISM

General Federation of Women's Clubs Rules Thrift One of Chief Activities

San Francisco Americanization, Thrift Committee Service, are the three outstanding activities of the organized club women of the United States for 1919. This was decided upon by the General Federation of Women's Clubs at their mid-biennial Council.
The Thrift campaign is under the direction of Miss Georgia A. Bacon, of Worcester, Mass. nationally for the General Federation, and Mrs. Edward Dexter Knight, former president of the California Federation of Women's Clubs, is California State Thrift chairman, and is also officially identified with the work in the Twelfth Federal Reserve District under Robert E. Smith, director of the War Loan Organization. She is engaged at present in working out a practical thrift "suggestionnaire" for use of women's clubs throughout the Twelfth Federal Reserve District.
"The time for inspirational talks and writing on Thrift is past," said Mrs. Knight. "The big thing now is to practice it. I think the suggestions will help the women of the West to practice it."
"We are far behind our War Savings Stamp quota in this district. It is up to the women to see that we lead the Government the money it has asked. In the average family the women hold the purse strings and they can save the money required by putting War Savings Stamps in their family budgets every week."
