NEARLY TWO YEARS' DELAY.

The statement is made that the nation-wide conspiracy against law and order was first discovered on April 30, 1919, is a falsehood that should not go unchallenged. That may have been the first time the department of justice began to realize the gravity of the situation, but it was not the first time it had cause to recognize the terrible menace to the good people of the United States. The Congressional Record for the Sixty-fifth congress carries the statement that on April 24, 1918, Senator Miles Poindexter, of Washington, and Senator Jacob H. Gallinger, of New Hampshire, called attention to the anarchistic movement then under way. Poindexter was talking on the "Mooney Case and the Propaganda of Anarchy." Unfortunately the subject was dismissed by many people with the assumption that the address was chiefly for partisan purposes. Subsequent disclosures demonstrated that Poindexter had a grasp of the situation and was uttering a warning that the department of justice could not comprehend. In the course of his address Senator Poindexter said:

"The greatest issue that confronts the American people and the whole western world is the suppression of this arrogant, insolent and tyrannical movement. Its leaders need to be subjected to the power of the government."

And yet it was more than a year later that the department of justice awoke to the situation and nearly two years later when it took action. During the course of Senator Poindexter's address, Senator Gallinger interrupted to remark that when the industrial commissioner was conducting an investigation in New York, a short time before St. John, whose record was so well established in Goldfield that he had to leave that camp, gave direct testimony advocating sabotage, violence and murder, yet that man after that testimony, was permitted to walk out of that room and join his compatriots in continuing the kind of thing that was being presented that day to the senate. In the course of the remarks it was pointed out that although the I. W. W. were endeavoring to act in the name of organized labor, they did not represent the ideas or interests of the laboring people of the United States. If the department had entered upon a determined effort to eradicate the bolshevists from the United States it is to be commended but the public should not be misled into believing that the anarchistic movement was not discovered until April, 1919.

LEGISLATIVE RETRENCHMENT.

A speech by Governor Frank O. Lowden of Illinois, delivered last night in New York, should be read by every good citizen who is intent on cutting down the cost of administering state and municipal business. The governor is one of the most advanced thinkers of his day who does not depend on demagoguery to retain his hold on the voters of his state. The latter regard him with such admiration that they firmly believe that he would be the most suitable candidate for the Republican party to run for president. Their experience has made them firm believers in the power of Lowden to apply the same principles in Washington as he did so successfully in Springfield where he remodeled the entire system of finance with such results that he effected most startling savings in the handling of public business. He took the ground that will appeal to the people of Nevada that the business of the government should not be diffused among commissions but that the personal equation should at all times govern the expenditure of public moneys. The admission system enables every member to pass the buck to his associates while the public pays the bills. Among the departments created in Illinois was the department of finance. The head of that department exercises general supervision over the finances of the state. He provides a uniform system of book-keeping, he approves or disapproves all vouchers and is in constant touch with the financial affairs of the state. In addition, it is his duty to prepare a budget of estimated expenditures and revenues to be submitted to each regular session of the legislature. When the legislature meets the director of finance submits a report with recommendations which is transmitted by the governor. The way in Nevada is for each official who expends money to make an estimate of what he desires and submit that direct to the legislature without revision by any one. He always asks for what he needs, and usually for more, and therefore the legislature, no matter how earnestly it tries to do its duty, has to guess at the amount of appropriations. In Illinois the director of finance has the information that he has acquired during the previous two years as to the needs of the various activities of the state in the exercise of his power of general supervision over the finances, and in addition he has been able to investigate for himself, when a request was made by any official charged with the expenditure of money as to the exact needs of the case. The budget thus submitted goes before the appropriations committee of the house and senate and with very few changes is enacted into law. It is to be regretted that other states in the union have not governors with the same amount of initiative to get away from the old fashioned stereotyped system of allowing the legislature every two years to muddle finances.

Cardinal Gibbons says the "reds" from alien lands who are always knocking the American government "have every opportunity to earn an honest living." But that is just what they are not looking for.

A commission that has been busy at Washington planning to revive official salaries upward, says that people are leaving the public service in droves because of the low pay. Have you noticed any diminution in the grand army of job holders?

National Commander D'Offier is right in his declaration that veterans of the world war stand for law and order. They fought to uphold the flag, and they will not tolerate its disgrace through lawlessness.

Colonel Brown isn't satisfied with three times as bad. How that man does enjoy fanning out!

ELY SCHOOL OF MINES IS TOO EXPENSIVE

A report to January 1, 1920, on the Ely school of mines has been sent to the director of vocational education. It was as follows:

Largest number of students registered for one month, 16.
 Smallest number of students registered for one month, 8.
 Number of attending student hours, 1,511.
 Number of instructional days, 85.
 Number of instructional hours, 630.

Average student hour attendance per day, 17.7.
 Average attendance per instructional hour, 2.96.
 Expenditures from July 1, 1919 to January 1, 1920, \$1,389.07.

The above report shows that it cost the state about 90 cents for each attendant student hour, which is considerably higher than it should be.
