President Will Decide If Men Are To Receive An Advance

SUCCESSOR NAMED FOR F. K. LANE

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—John Bryan Payne, of Illinois, has been selected by President Wilson to be secretary of the interior, succeeding Franklin K. Lane. Payne is now chairman of the United States shipping board.

RAILROAD BILL TO BE RUSHED TO ENACTMENT

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—While some opposition to the railroad bill, as finally agreed upon in conference, has developed, senate and house leaders predicted today that the conference report on the measure would be promptly adopted so the legislation would be on the statute books before the roads are returned to private control March 1.

LORD GREY MAY NOT COME BACK

LONDON, Feb. 12.—Replying to a question in the house of commons whether Viscount Grey would return to Washington as British ambassador, and, if not, who would be his successor, Premier Lloyd-George said he was unable to make a statement on the subject.

STOPPED FROM MEXICAN TRIP

OTTAWA, Feb. 12.—Parliament will be asked to appropriate \$200,000 to complete ships under construction for the dominion government. It was learned today.

AIR SERVICE TO BUENOS AIRES

SAO FRANCISCO, Feb. 12.—The United States government has completed plans for an air service between New York and Buenos Aires and can put them into effect within two weeks according to an announcement by the Latin American committee of the San Francisco chamber of commerce.

RESIGNS FROM NAVAL PRISON

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—A sailor (Phoebus Mott) who had been in Washington navy prison has tendered his resignation. Navy officials said the resignation had been accepted with the charges on his record being removed at his request.

NO THREAT HAS BEEN RECEIVED

BERLIN, Feb. 12.—The German foreign office has not yet received the note expected to have been forwarded by Premier MacDonald during his visit to Berlin with indefinite suspension of Rheinland province because of dissatisfaction of treaty obligations.

PIONEER MINING KING DIES IN LOS ANGELES

SEATTLE, Feb. 12.—James W. Mackay, pioneer miner of the Klondike and Nevada, died yesterday at Los Angeles, according to news received here. Mackay formerly owned a big Seattle cafe.

Result of Conferences Is Given Out Jointly After a Night Session

A minimum wage of \$4.50 per shift was agreed upon last evening at a conference of mine operators and representatives of the Trades Assembly, including the crafts and the Mine and Mill workers' organization. This agreement is subject to ratification by the various branches of labor. The crafts have called meetings this evening to vote on the proposition and, as soon as the result is made known to the operators, formal action will be taken looking to a general resumption of activities in Tonopah and the Divide districts.

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LIGHT TO SHINE AT ARROWHEAD

Arrowhead will be supplied with electric illumination in a short time. This was the result of a meeting held last evening at which W. J. Falkenberg entered into a contract to install a Delco-Lia dynamo. Mr. Falkenberg left this morning for Arrowhead, stopping at Ely on his way to Salt Lake City, where he expects to procure the equipment. The Signal will also take power from this plant. The Arrowhead Silver Mines association arranged for 50 lights to be displayed on Main Street, Arrowhead avenue and other sections of the town where business requires.
