SHIPLOAD REFUGEES WRECKED

By Associated Press. LONDON, Feb. 13.—The former German steamer Gregor with 200 British refugees from Odessa, broke apart from a vessel having her in tow and grounded near Kilis Wednesday, according to a Lloyd dispatch from Constantinople, and 130 persons were rescued. The vessel is reported breaking up.

WIFEBEATER IN A MURDER CASE

By Associated Press. LOS ANGELES, Feb. 13.—Mrs. Jennie Zeoli was held by the police today pending investigation of the circumstances surrounding the death of her husband, John Zeoli. The man was found dead in his bed early today when a passerby responded to Mrs. Zeoli's calls from a window. Zeoli had been shot through the head as he lay in bed. The wife denied the shooting, but said she had been married to Zeoli fourteen years and he had beaten her every night.

CANADA STANDS FOR FULL POWER

OTTAWA, Feb. 13.—Canada has given Great Britain notice that it objects to any change in the covenant of the league of nations which will prevent the dominion from being a full fledged member of the league and having a vote in the assembly. Urgent representations have been forwarded to the imperial authorities protesting against acceptance by Great Britain of the League of Nations reservation to the peace treaty which now is being considered by the United States senate.

The first meeting was chiefly a celebration of the expected early victory of equal suffrage. Mrs. Catt, president of the association, urged the delegates to resolve because there is no earthly power that can do more than delay by a trifle the final enfranchisement of women.

2000 MURDERED IN ARMENIA

By Associated Press. LONDON, Feb. 13.—The Armenian national delegation states that at least 2,000 Armenians were murdered in Armenia during the recent attacks by nationalist forces in Asia Minor. The Armenians were murdered in cold blood.

WAGNERS OPERA GIVEN IN ROME

(Correspondence Associated Press). ROME, Jan. 26.—Wagnerian opera has returned to the stage of the Costanzi theatre in Rome without a protest. "The Walkure" was advertised as the second offering in a season which opened with Mascagni's "Iris." No criticism of the plan to produce the German opera appeared in the press. The theatre was crowded and no objections interposed with a performance which the press of Rome commended highly. "It is a strange coincidence that Richard Wagner again walked across the stage of the Costanzi at the same time Austrian children came into Italy by the thousands to escape the hunger and privations of their unhappy country," one of the Rome Post's commenters. For many months Wagnerian music has been used at concerts in Rome and other Italian cities, especially in Milan and Bologna, without objections from the press or the public.

900,000 JEWS SAW SERVICE

(Correspondence of Associated Press). LONDON, Jan. 28.—Dr. Max Norland told the English Zionist Federation for other day that in the world war the Jews had furnished 900,000 soldiers to the various armies. This he said was about seven per cent of the whole number of Jews, a proportion equaled by few and surpassed only by the Negroes of the French. The Jews had lost 50,000 dead and had about 200,000 casualties.

COAL SELLS AT \$40 TON IN NOME

BRITISH COLUMBIA BUILDS UP EXPORTS

By Associated Press. VICTORIA, B. C., Feb. 13.—British Columbia exports of manufactured goods and raw materials during the last year totaled \$52,856,255 in value according to figures compiled by F. M. Ryder, United States consul general here. Exports in 1918 were valued at \$37,291,000, Mr. Ryder said. Lumber exports, including logs, lumber, pulp and paper were valued at \$23,887,188 during 1919 as compared with \$12,249,765 in 1918, according to Mr. Ryder's figures.

JAPANESE ERECT POWERFUL RADIO

ALAMEDA NAVAL BASE ASSURED

By Associated Press. WASHINGTON, Feb. 13.—The nation's most pressing need is the establishment of a navy base in California, Secretary Daniels told a delegation from Alameda, Calif., today in accepting tentatively the deal for a base site in that city.

HOLLAND URGED TO RECONSIDER

By Associated Press. LONDON, Feb. 13.—A new allied message to Holland regarding extradition of the former German superior will be dispatched tomorrow evening, the Standard said. The note makes a strong appeal to the Dutch government not to create greater difficulties in Europe by insisting on the right of asylum for a man charged as the author of the world's present troubles.

EUROPE HONORS ELIHU ROOT

Proposal Embodied In Reply According to Unofficial Reports

By Associated Press. WASHINGTON, Feb. 13.—An "unofficial decision" in the railway wage controversy was made today by President Wilson in conference with representatives of the brotherhoods. The president said the government's policy was "based on justice to all interests." The president's decision was not announced at the White House, where officials said it was a "decision containing a proposal." From this it was assumed that the president refused to grant general wage increases but made a counter proposal to the union. Secretary Taft declined to say whether the president had refused specifically the wage demands, saying "every one wants to settle and the brotherhoods should have an opportunity to consider the president's proposal."

KOLCHAK DEATH IS CONFIRMED

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INJUNCTION IN FORCE AGAINST THE AGITATORS

DENVER, Feb. 13.—An injunction against any public interference with the organized labor unions in Nevada, the injunction was made permanent and stands today as effective as the highest law with relation to any subsequent act or behavior in violation of the clearly specified terms. The injunction in part prohibits the following among other acts:
