COLOMBIA FILES STRONG PROTEST

(Correspondence of Associated Press) BUENOS AIRES, Jan. 25.—La Epoca, organ of the government party in Argentina, has just published a communication from the Colombian legation giving the text of resolutions adopted by the senate and house of representatives of Colombia on November 3 last protesting against the alleged infringement by the United States of Colombia's rights over the isthmus of Panama. The resolutions of the house complain against the failure of the United States senate to approve the treaty of April 6, 1914, and protests against the proposed celebration of a new post "quite foreign" to the April 6 convention. By the treaty of April 6, 1914, the United States would have expressed "regret" and paid Colombia \$25,000,000 for its action in Panama. That treaty has not been approved by the United States senate.

MAKING TURPS ON THE COAST

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Feb. 18.—Only one country, France, can be considered a rival of the United States in the production of naval stores, and her production is about one-fourth as much as the United States. Aside from lumber, the southern pines, particularly the longleaf pine, are a source of our naval stores, representing a value in excess of \$20,000,000 a year. The position of the United States in these important raw materials at present is a commanding one. A new project in naval stores is opening in the west where the forest service has given a permit to a Portland, Ore., Argentine company to extract turpentine from 150 acres of Douglas firs on the Umpqua National Forest. This company is pioneering the new industry in the west.

KOREANS PREFER DEATH FIRST

(Correspondence Associated Press) SHANGHAI, Jan. 30.—The Koreans will suffer extermination before they will acquiesce in the rule of Japan, declares a prominent Korean leader, formerly one of Korea's chief statesmen and officials who has penetrated the Japanese cordon around Korea. He is now one of the members of the little community of Korean refugees who have found haven here in China.

STEAM PIPES ARE PLUGGED UP

(Correspondence Associated Press) LONDON, Feb. 3.—The German liner Cap Polonia, on which the former German Emperor had planned to make a trip around the world when the war was won, was allotted to a leading shipping company who gave her up after the first voyage owing to the enormous coal consumption of the vessel. Since then a number of wooden pipes and other obstructions have been found in the steam pipes. The removal of these obstructions is expected to reduce the steamer's coal consumption to normal.

BLACKMAILERS RUN TO EARTH IN CHINA

(Correspondence of Associated Press) SHANGHAI, Jan. 23.—Shanghai police in recent weeks have been engaged with the task of running to earth an organized gang of blackmailers, all of whom are believed to be Chinese, who have been using bombs in stores and public places when their demands met with refusal. So far, but one arrest has been made.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

To Secretaries of Corporations Doing Business in Nevada But Incorporated in Other States
NOT TOO LATE TO SAVE \$100 PER MONTH

SECTION 1—All foreign corporations doing business in the State of Nevada shall, not later than the month of March in each year, beginning in the year 1914, publish a statement of their last year's business in some newspaper published in the State of Nevada. If published in a daily newspaper, such statement shall be published for a period of one week, or if published in a semi-weekly or tri-weekly newspaper, for a period of two weeks; or if published in a weekly newspaper for a period of four weeks.

SECTION 2—The secretary of the company publishing the statement shall file a copy with the assessor of each county of the State of Nevada, in which said company is doing business.

SECTION 4—Any district attorney in the state is competent to sue to recover the penalty, or the attorney general. The first county suing through its district attorney shall secure the penalty, and if no suit is brought for the penalty by any district attorney the State shall have the right to recover through its attorney general.
