WELLS BANDITS GIVE SELVES UP

The men hunt in the mountainous hills of White Pine county, with its trail of two lines, which followed the robbery of the commissary of the Union Land & Cattle company at Bush last week, came to an unexpected climax at East Ely at the foot of the Stopton valley, shortly after five o'clock Monday morning, when Leon W. Frisco, alias Al Frito, alias Will Frost, was captured in a saloon in the railroad yards.

Following the surrender of his accomplice, Jim Bell, to the sheriff at White Pine county.

A L. St. Clair, constable at Death and George Regan, victims of the fleeing bandits, were shot from an auto as they threaded their way along the trail of their assassins.

As St. Clair lay dead and Regan fatally wounded with a bullet hole through his head, the bandits rifled their pockets of personal valuables, appropriated their ammunition and resumed the flight.

According to a confession made by Bell the officers, absorbed in following the trail which led toward the mountains from the stolen automobile which the robbers abandoned along a ledge down, were completely by surprise when Frisco opened fire and over had a chance.

With great posess of determined men conducting a reconnaissance and report on the situation, and the fact that the fugitives, convinced that to make a stand would be futile, they set out at a run for Ely and across more shortly after midnight.

Had he taken a chance, Bell, the runner of the two-way to the sheriff at White Pine county had given himself up. He made a full confession to the sheriff and told him his companion was in hiding in the railroad yards at East Ely.

EL PASO, Texas, Feb. 24.—The new step in the Rio Grande reclamation project is community building and colonization, according to L. M. Lawson, project engineer at El Paso, in a statement just published in the latest issue of the Farm Bureau News, distributed by the county farm bureau of the El Paso chamber of commerce.

"With ample storage works provided to guarantee a sufficient supply of water, even over dry seasons, and drainage canals excavated to such an extent that a large area of the cultivated lands are protected from the rise of ground water, development turns from such work to the use of the benefits provided," Mr. Lawson says.

"The work will be completed by the reclamation service consists of the extension of the drainage works into areas not yet relieved by the water logged condition; the extension of the canal system to new areas; the reconstruction of a limited amount of the old systems and the reorganization of an operating force of adequate training to operate and maintain the system provided.
