HOUSE OF FIRE SEEN IN HAWAII

HILA, Island of Hawaii, T. H., Feb. 15.—By Mail.—Halemaumau, the "House of Fire" of Kilauea volcano, presented a spectacle, which for combined beauty and grandeur exceeded anything he had seen in his years of experience observing the volcano, Professor T. A. Jaggar, Jr., said today.

The three lakes, formerly a familiar sight to visitors to the volcano, became merged into one stupendous body of boiling lava three hundred feet below the mouth of the volcano. Above the surface of the restless lava was a delicate veil of mist, which was absorbed by the heat every few moments, revealing a shimmering mass of living, boiling colors beneath. Above the "House of Fire" and hanging over the dead lava fields, stretching away from the rim of the volcano was a faint glow as a background for a perfect path of almost blinding earth.

PUTTING SHIPS ON THE PACIFIC

(By Associated Press) SAN FRANCISCO, March 11.—Within the past nine months the United States shipping board has put 56,813 deadweight tons of shipping in the Pacific, has established a coastwise service of sixteen vessels in the far east running from north China to Calcutta, and has arranged for the addition of fourteen big passenger liners to trans-Pacific trade, according to announcement by the board's offices here today.

The far east coastwise service is unique in that none of the vessels touch at an American port and it is as distinctively far eastern as if it were being operated by China, India or Japan. The object of this service is to supply "feeders" for the trans-Pacific routes recently established or added to by the shipping board in the allocation of vessels to American Pacific ports. The boats operate on the routes lateral to the trans-oceanic routes, serving the same purpose as railroad short lines connecting with overland business. The boats average 4,000 deadweight tons and are proving a big factor in opening up the vast resources of north China, the shipping board said.

An important contemplated route is that between Puget Sound ports and Buenos Aires by way of the Straits of Magellan. It has been found that this route is approximately 1,000 miles shorter than the Panama canal route. A boat a month will be put on this route and the service will be established within sixty days, the board said. The route will be a new one for American trade in every sense of the word.

WHO WAS WHO IN WORLD WAR

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, March 11.—Barney Baruch had more power during the war than any other man in the world.

Barney Baruch controlled also literally the food supply of the United States.

Barney Baruch originated the price-fixing policy for all commodities and put it in operation.

Barney Baruch suggested taking over of the railroads by the government which was done.

Barney Baruch regulated the production of steel, copper and iron and directed their disposition.

Barney Baruch had supreme authority over the production of the coke ovens of this country and dominated as the source of supply the nitrates and fertilizers of the world.

Barney Baruch regulated the shipping of the United States, laid down its policy as to what should be sent abroad and the quantity and what should not.

In fact, continued Representative W. J. Graham of Illinois, chairman of the special committee investigating war expenditures, "we actually had in the war a super-president in Mr. Baruch, as head of the war in industry board and intimate of Mr. Wilson here and in Paris. Those are not my statements, I have given you my replies under oath made by Mr. Baruch in his examination before our committee."

PROTESTS EXTRAVAGANCE.

WASHINGTON, March 11.—Pointing out that according to treasury figures the public debt exceeded \$26,000,000,000 and that property of every kind and description was taxed to the limit, Representative Ricketts of Ohio protested in a speech in the house against the waste and extravagance which marks the conduct of the government under the present democratic administration.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

To Secretaries of Corporations Doing Business in Nevada But Incorporated in Other States NOT TOO LATE TO SAVE \$100 PER MONTH

SECTION 1—All foreign corporations doing business in the State of Nevada shall, not later than the month of March in each year, beginning in the year 1914, publish a statement of their last year's business in some newspaper published in the State of Nevada. If published in a daily newspaper, such statement shall be published for a period of one week, or if published in a semi-weekly or tri-weekly newspaper, for a period of two weeks, or if published in a weekly newspaper for a period of four weeks.

SECTION 2—The secretary of the company publishing the statement shall file a copy with the assessor of each county of the State of Nevada, in which said company is doing business.

SECTION 4—Any district attorney in the state is competent to sue to recover the penalty, or the attorney general. The first county suing through its district attorney shall secure the penalty, and if no suit is brought for the penalty by any district attorney the State shall have the right to recover through its attorney-general.
