BORAX MANAGER VISITS TONOPAH

Chris B. Zabriskie, vice president and general manager of the Pacific Coast Borax company, motored up from the headquarters of the company in Death valley, arriving last evening and returning this morning. Mr. Zabriskie is making a general tour of inspection of the borax interests in Nevada and California and will return to Oakland by train. Mr. Zabriskie has been detained longer than usual on the coast owing to a severe attack of rheumatism but is feeling well now and fit to go back to the financial headquarters of the company in New York.

Mr. Zabriskie was accompanied by Frank M. Jenifer, traffic manager, W. W. Cahill, superintendent, and Dave Aspland, general agent of the Tonopah & Tidewater and C. M. Itator.

ARROWHEAD IS LOOKING FINE

M. J. McVeigh, manager of the Arrowhead Extension, returned to camp this afternoon with guides for the 175-foot level on the new strike level omitted in the shipment from Tonopah. He took Judge McPadden around the district yesterday and the judge remarked that he never saw another place with all the earmarks of a permanent camp. He was especially pleased with the location of the Arrowhead Extension which stands on the direct strike of the main Arrowhead vein. The big company is bringing soap picture rock to the surface and it is reported that eight feet of highgrade filled with black metal has been cut on the 175-foot level on the new strike to the west drift. The Extension shaft is down 87 feet in the sulphide zone. The Signal has a nice stringer at a depth of 100 feet.

HIGH GRADE IN THE OLD MONTEZUMA MINE

Ore from the old Montezuma mine, west of Goldfield, exhibited in Tonopah this morning caused considerable excitement. The samples in large chunks carried lead, silver and copper with the values running over \$1,000 for picked specimens. Nothing like the rock has been seen here and the fact that such a body of ore remained neglected in one of the oldest worked mines of southern Nevada suggests the wealth of the property when greater depth is reached.

The property is owned by the Montezuma Silver Mines corporation which was organized when the old producer of the district was taken over by the present company backed by some of the richest men in the United States with ample working capital to develop to an almost unlimited extent. The ground is held under United States patent and consists of eleven claims. The company was organized by Attorney E. K. Thompson, who is one of the leading stockholders.

The present strike is sulphide ore at a depth of 255 feet. A general shovel sample of the ore across five feet runs 200 ounces in silver. A rich streak on the hanging wall of about ten inches wide runs 912 ounces silver. The rich ore was struck yesterday, and last night the superintendent of the property said there was three feet on the hanging wall of solid metal.

At the Goldfield hotel last night the excitement was the biggest known since the Jumbo Ex boom. Crowds filled the hotel examining the ore. Over twenty automobiles left Goldfield last night to inspect the Montezuma district.

The Montezuma property is financed by New York capital and none of the stock is for sale. The management invites the public to inspect the mine at any and all times and take their own samples. The property, in the early 70s produced about \$1,800,000 gross, but closed down when silver was demagogued. The property was reopened about a year ago when New York capital started development work.

HEARING PETITIONS FOR NATURALIZATION

C. A. Hall, naturalization commissioner, from San Francisco, will arrive here March 27 to hear applications for admission to citizenship. Only three applications have been filed to date. There are several service men from Manhattan, Round Mountain and Tonopah who will take advantage of the presence of the commissioner to complete their naturalization.
