FRENCH ARMY FOR GERMANY

Marshal Foch Starts Preparing For An Armed Invasion

USED AN OBSOLETE WAR CODE

WASHINGTON, March 15.—German submarines were enabled to attack the first convoy of American troop ships sent to France because the navy department used an unsafe code which was intercepted and deciphered Rear Admiral Sims today told the senate investigating committee.

SALE OF GROUND AT MONTEZUMA

A. G. Cummings, of the Nivco Mining company, operating in the Silver Peak district, has taken over a group of nine claims in the Montezuma district. These adjoin the holdings of the Montezuma Mines corporation on the south side of the Arizona claim at a distance of 300 feet. The ground was sampled by Mr. Cummings after a close inspection and after securing returns from the surface running from \$3 to \$400. The Cummings ground carries three known ledges. From samples taken from the workings of the Arizona Mr. Cummings secured returns as high as \$8 a pound and from three feet of the ledge got \$540 in silver. The grantees were Remick, McDonald and associates.

J. W. Storer has sold the holdings of the Moore and Gold Dollar to San Francisco capital for immediate development. These claims are 3250 feet west of the strike, with two ledges cropping. These will be incorporated as the Montezuma Nevada Silver Star Mining company. Remick, Mike Clark, W. A. Wheeler, D. Malone, E. W. Sutter and J. W. Storer have organized a company known as the Montezuma Silver Mines West Extension which endorses the new strike of the Arizona on the west. The management of the company wired the New York office this morning that a production of \$100 a day could begin at once.

GOLDFIELD HOTEL MAY KEEP OPEN

This afternoon a conference was held with a delegation from Goldfield in connection with the proposed dismantling of the Goldfield hotel so that the material might be used in construction of the new Humboldt hotel at Winnemucca. Mr. Wingfield proposed that if the citizens of Goldfield put up \$25,000 he would put up an equal amount and the town retain the hotel. Mr. Wingfield is one of the large stockholders in the proposed Humboldt hotel and this action means that he will have to subscribe \$10,000 additional to that hotel.

NEW GOVERNMENT DENIED RECOGNITION

WASHINGTON, March 15.—A resolution proposing legislation "into the United States Treasury" for the benefit of former service men surplus war profits held by the Standard Oil, United States Steel corporation and others was introduced by Representative Little.

FIRE WIPES OUT TOWN IN TEXAS

MIAMI, Tex., March 15.—Town today found this farming town or more than 1,000 inhabitants virtually in ruins from a fire which burned from yesterday afternoon on all early this morning, destroying most of the town's eight business blocks, 200 residences and causing property damage in excess of \$1,500,000.

WOMAN NAMED FOR HIGH OFFICE

SALT LAKE CITY, March 15.—Utah and Nevada, comprising the forty-eighth customs district, will have the first woman customs collector in the United States if the senate ratifies the recently presidential appointment of Mrs. Estelle V. Collier of Salt Lake City to that position. She is to succeed T. F. Thomas resigned.

OAKLAND GIRL MEETS DEATH BY STRANGLER

OAKLAND, March 15.—The body of Eric Carlson, aged 19, a maid employed by Willard Brown, capitalist, was found strangled to death in a vacant lot in the most fashionable district of Oakland today. The girl apparently made a desperate fight for her life. The police have no clues. The condition of the body indicated that a criminal assault had been attempted by the murderer.

TREATY VOTING BEGINS TODAY

WASHINGTON, March 15.—Paving the way for a final vote on the reservation to Article X, the senate today rejected by 50 to 17 Senator Frelinghuysen's substitute proposing summary disavowal to all obligations. A reservation worked out but not agreed to in a bipartisan conference was offered by Senator Kirby and was rejected. A new reservation drafted by the republican leader to deny the obligation of Article X of the peace treaty was substituted in the senate today for the reservation which was adopted last November. The vote was 50 to 24, with one republican voting against.

A. E. F. TROOPS PERISH IN FIRE

WASHINGTON, March 15.—Two members of the American expeditionary force at Vladivostok were burned to death in a fire which destroyed the American barracks March 15. Two others are missing, the war department today was advised by Major General Graves.

U. S. TROOPS ON RHINE NEUTRAL

WASHINGTON, March 15.—While American troops under the direction of Marshal Pech, American troops in the Rhine zone will not participate in any military operations in Germany, a neutral position was announced today by the war department.

LANDSLIDES IN PANAMA ZONE BLOCK CANAL

WASHINGTON, March 15.—Heavy rain clouds undertaking passage of the Panama canal will probably be subject to an occasional delay of a day or two as a result of continuing landslides at Cuenavaca, the war department was advised by Governor Hardine of the canal zone.

KAISER GLOOMY UNDER STRAIN

AMSTERDAM, March 15.—Former Emperor William spent the greater part of Sunday in the garden of his palace, where he paced up and down with a gloomy expression of his face under nervous tension. The death of the empress of the last few days was a heavy blow to him, it is said that he cannot tolerate the company of others.

VIENNA, March 15.—A dispute between social fighting has occurred between troops of the national guard and communists in which nine were killed.
