RED BADGE DISPLAYED AT GRAVE

BRITTE, April 28. A thousand men, some wearing the U. S. W. emblem, marched through Britte today behind the hoarse bawling of the body of Thomas Manning, one of the British men shot in a clash between strikers and officials last week. More men went to work in the mines today and United States soldiers patrolled all streets leading to the mines.

GERMANS MUST LEAVE FIRST

PARIS, April 28.—Premier Miller, in making a declaration to the Chamber of Deputies today on the results of the supreme council meeting at San Remo said Frankfort and Darmstadt would be evacuated by the French as soon as the allied commissions had established that German armed forces over the number allowed had been withdrawn.

CONFESS TO KILLING GIRL

PONTIAC, Mich., April 28.—Anson Best confessed today, according to prosecutor C. Gillespie, that he killed Vera Schneider, an 18 year old telephone operator, whose body was found Sunday on the porch of an unoccupied building. Best said the girl asked him to kill her because she was "simply in the way of others."

REBELS CAPTURE ANOTHER TOWN ON THE COAST

WASHINGTON, April 28.—Advises from Mexico through official channels state that the rebels have occupied the town of Alvarado on the gulf coast and federal troops have been sent from Vera Cruz in an effort to regain control of that port. At Salina Cruz, on the Pacific coast all business places were reported closed yesterday as a result of a revolt of the government garrison which robbed the post office and stores and disarmed the police.

FORBES HELD FOR MURDER TRIAL

William J. Forbes, of Arrowhead, who is charged with killing Clarence Eaton, near Hanford, Calif., in March last, has been indicted by the grand jury and will stand trial for the murder. Forbes, it will be remembered, admitted the killing, but claims justification because Eaton interfered with his domestic affairs. Many residents of Death, where both parties formerly lived, justify Forbes in the killing.

FIRE AIRPLANES ARE LIMITED

WASHINGTON, April 28.—Because of the depleted personnel only one aviation squadron will be detailed for foreign observation this year, the war department announced. The ninth squadron will be based at Mather field to cover California forest reserves. No squadrons are available for Washington, Oregon, Nevada or Utah.

SULPHIDES SHOW IN THE PIONEER

At a depth of 600 feet the main shaft of the Reorganized Pioneer Mines company has entered the sulphide zone. This is the most important discovery in the history of the southern end of Nye county including the old Bullfrog district and one which points to a general resumption of mining activities.

SERVE SUMMONS BY ADVERTISING

MINDEN, Nev., April 28. As just the Mary Pickford and Owen Moore are to be served with the summons in the state suit to set aside the divorce decree of Helen Langham, the order of service will be by publication in a Gardnerville newspaper, copies of which will be sent to Mary Pickford and Owen Moore at Hollywood, California.

WINGFIELD NOT A CANDIDATE

"Reports that I will be a candidate for the Republican nomination for United States senator this year are without foundation and wholly unauthorized said George Wingfield, in discussing a rumor that he had consented to seek such a place. 'I understand that a movement has been started in my behalf,' continued Wingfield, 'but I am not a party to it, will not consider such a proposition for a moment and have so informed those back of it. I have been honored by the party by being endorsed for national committeeman and while I have had no experience with the duties of such a post I intend to devote my efforts toward bringing success to the Republican ticket and placing Nevada in the Republican column this year.'"

AGREEMENT REACHED ON WATER POWER

WASHINGTON, April 28.—An agreement on the water power bill was reached today by senate and house conferees but chances agreed upon had not been made public until the conference report is ready for submission to the house.

THIRTY DAYS IN JAIL FOR RUSSIAN JOHN

John Chief, better known among the miners as "Russian John" who declared himself a Bolshevik on Main street and gathered a crowd when arrested, was sentenced to serve 30 days in the county jail by Justice Grier. Chief has always been troublesome when drunk and has been under arrest frequently.

MAY OPEN TRADE WITH RUSSIA

ATLANTIC CITY, April 28.—The board of directors of the United States Chamber of Commerce today authorized appointment of a commission to proceed to Europe to investigate the possibility of resumption of trade relations with Russia.

U. S. ENGINEERS LEAVE SIBERIA

SAN FRANCISCO, April 28.—No American troops but a few Red Cross workers remain in Siberia while the Stevens party of American Engineers expect to be out May 1st, according to arrivals today on the transport Great Northern from Vladivostok.

TURKS AMBUSH FRENCH ARMY

PARIS, April 28.—Official accounts of the French retreat from Ufa, Azerbaijan, confirm reports that the retreating column was ambushed at Ufa though the French had an agreement with the Turks which they believed would ensure safe retirement. The French left Ufa only when food and water were lacking after a six day march of two weeks.

WAITING NEWS FROM FALLON OIL STRIKE

Nothing was heard today from the party of Tonopah men who left for Fallon yesterday with the pledge that they would report immediately on the outlook for an oil boom. The only message was from George W. Foster, one of the large stock holders, who stated there could be no doubt about the presence of oil but it was impossible to make estimates. From his description it appears that water was encountered at 100 feet and this flow covers the oil and gas which were not struck until the 200 point. It is believed that the presence of the oil is considerable since it is seeping to the surface through the water in several places by the constant bubbling caused by the lower elements expanding for escape.

George W. Foster of the firm of Richardson & Foster made a report on yesterday. Leaving here at 11 o'clock he reached Fallon at 7 p. m. covering the 124 miles in six hours according to a telegram received from him last night. The message which undoubtedly have oil, but quantity cannot be proven until pumping is finished and has ceased off to 200 feet. This work will take three days, according to all men on definite information as to the extent of the flow to get reported before Friday. The Illinois company which controls the most desired well in the state has reached a depth of 200 feet and expect to pass through the limestone in 20 feet more. Green oil is coming through the track which is accepted as an indication of presence.

AMERICA FIRST FOR OUR MARINES

WASHINGTON, April 28.—Establishment of an "America First" policy of development for the American merchant marine is provided in a bill drafted as a substitute for the house merchant marine bill by the senate commerce committee. The bill provides that coastwise shipping must be entirely American owned.

CREW CROWDED IN A VILE HOLE

SAN FRANCISCO, April 28. While on board a cargo steamer quarantined at the Alaska wharves, Mark M. Lorenson, alias a known name on the ship's list, is under the impression that he will be kept with Lorenson. The police intervened in detailing an investigation of the conditions aboard that vessel. Most of the crew were sent back to Los Angeles, in a tug, but Lorenson's ship will be shipped today. The men said they were fed one meal a day.
