

MORE TRUCKS FOR REVELLE MINE

George H. Kent, one of the successful leasers at Reveille, was in town today attending to the business of buying up two new White five-ton trucks that are needed to keep the ore moving from the mine to the railroad. Mr. Kent has been shipping 100 tons a month but this quantity will be greatly increased as soon as he can get the transport service reorganized. Under the present limited hauling three railroad cars are always enroute and one car is at the smelter for Salt Lake.

EUREKA GROUP SOLD ON COAST

Colorado and California capitalists have taken over a group of three claims in Eureka with the intention of prosecuting the immediate development. The claims are the Bowman, Hazine and Kinpa (two) which are situated between Ruby Hill and the Saltwater. The deepest shaft is 300 feet and the Bowman is credited with a production of \$50,000. The purchase was made on a report furnished by J. H. Leonard and the payment was made through the office of Clarence H. Andrews, a mining attorney of Los Angeles.

SPARKS LABORER SHOT BY ACCIDENT

A verdict of accidental death was returned by a coroner's jury at Sparks in the matter of the death of Ed's Buchanan, a laborer who was shot and killed by the accidental discharge of a rifle held by Leandro Montero. Buchanan was shot through the head and killed instantly. It appeared from the evidence that Montero was about to purchase a rifle from Louis Cordova and believed he had opened an eye when he fired. He aimed the gun and it exploded, one shot having been left in the chamber. Buchanan was sitting on a bench in a corner of the room and the bullet entered his right eye.

NEW POWER PROJECT WOULD DESTROY BIG FALLS

Residents of Bradport and persons residing in the territory adjacent to the Vanishing Creek falls, two miles east of Tropic pass the eastern entrance to Yosemite Falls, are making a vigorous protest against the proposal of the Nevada-California Power company to build a reservoir above the falls and thus convert the water to another point for use in generating power.

Soon after the entrance of the United States in the war the successes of the Central Powers in Roumania had reduced that country to a most tragic condition and in the summer of 1917, the American Red Cross dispatched its first Roumanian relief contingent. Two hospitals were at once taken over and operated by the Red Cross, a canteen for the starving refugees established and food and clothing distributed over a large area. Transportation was one of the toughest problems with which the Red Cross workers in Roumania had to deal. HAND GRENADES USED 500 YEARS AGO IN BATTLE

Government Giving Away Bombs Intended for Doughboys' Use

Washington hand grenades, which the Government will shortly make available to 100,000 individuals through public and great companies as souvenirs in the Great War, date back by centuries as war weapons. They were known to have been used in 1427 at the siege of the Fortress of Buzandjick, on the River Bos, the soldiers using a glass bottle filled with powder. The term "grenade" grew out of the training of the best qualified soldiers of the Louis XIV in 1746, to hurl these grenades. In English papers, as well as the Grenadiers' records from the Seventeenth Century. The Russo-Japanese war, however, developed the grenade into the efficient weapon it is today. The Grenade was used in the Great War, and other military operations, and was used from scrap heaps and filled with powder. These were the immediate forerunners of the modern cast iron corrugated TNT grenades, which caused so much destruction when hurled into a German trench or dugout. It is the Mills grenade with the TNT removed that the Government is putting out now as souvenirs.
