IF OREGON MAKES GOOD.

It is too early to judge of the stability of the Oregon government which vanquished the Carranza despotism in an almost bloodless revolution but, if it should indeed after the lapse of ninety days that the new administration is auspicious there will ensue a rush to the Latin lands that will compare with the great mining hegiras of history. Americans will be in the van for the reason that they constitute a majority of the exiled foreign element that was doing so much to improve and develop the industrial and agricultural resources of the neighboring republic. The miners have faith in the ability of the Sonora leaders to install an administration that will set about a movement for the redemption of the southern republic from the gross abuses that were sponsored and perpetuated by the infamous oligarchy which declared an open season for Americans and everything American.

The oil districts will receive a wonderful impetus and the United States will be the chief beneficiary since the introduction of modern methods in the oil fields will increase the exports of petroleum products and avert the famine which confronts all oil consumers at the present time. Only owners of oil-burning furnaces and appliances know how acute this shortage has become as their interests have been suffering in precarious proximity to the point where complete suspension of fuel oil shipments was looming in the near future. Large oil corporations at Tampico have sensed the change of administration and have been preparing for the coming of a more friendly government. According to information received last week when the revolution was in its incipient stage the American oil companies sent instructions to their representatives to resume the drilling of new wells which had been suspended or at a low ebb for years as well as to renew exploitation in general. Cables of the Mexican Petroleum company expressed an expectation of an increase of production by reason of the changed conditions and urgent orders were sent for a general resumption of operations. As an illustration of the effect of the new order of affairs it may be stated that the Mexican Petroleum company will begin the immediate drilling of 26 wells upon its lands. It has ordered construction on two pipe lines, one 100 miles long with an eight-inch diameter tubing and the other 70 miles long with a 10-inch diameter tubing. The company also announces the shipping of 51 high powered extraction pumps and further instructs its engineers to proceed at once to build 800 tanks for the storage of petroleum. Once these initial works are completed it is expected that the company will be able to export 125,000 barrels a day.

WHERE IS THE JUSTICE?

The jury in the Frisco murder case brought in a verdict of guilty in the first degree and then recommended life imprisonment. It is incredible that any jury in Nevada could be found willing to place itself on record in this manner after deliberating on the evidence which showed the maximum of brutality and the absence of all mitigating circumstances. The two criminals who laid in ambush and shot down officers of the law did not have the slightest extenuation for their crime and, when the facts became known, there was an urgent demand for summary punishment. The verdict of the jury is an incentive to mob violence and may be taken as ample justification for taking human life without resorting to the courts where maudlin jurors can be swayed to such an extent that they can deliberately acquit themselves of such a finding. There is no room for this mawkish sentiment. The murder was of a most aggravating order as it was a cold blooded assassination. The value of the property at issue was scarcely out of the class of petty larceny. Nevertheless these men laid in ambush and trapped the officers who were on their trail and shot them down wantonly without the least excuse for he deed. Had they remained under cover and let the officers pursue the trail they were following the murderers might have eluded pursuit and escaped while the deputies were aimlessly trying to recover the lost trail. Jurors cannot expect much sympathy when they indulge in a recommendation to mercy for such arch criminals who know a life sentence means only a few years at easy confinement and then a pardon from the Board of Pardons whose chief mission appears to be in emptying the State's prison. In some quarters this is looked upon as a madness with method designed to retrench in the maintenance of the prison and thus offset the extravagance of the state administration in other directions.

Why doesn't Mr. McAdoo direct a little attention to the estimates for appropriations of unheard-of extravagance which the administration through the Cabinet heads and high officials keeps sending to Congress. The answer is that Mr. McAdoo doesn't want to shoo away any support the administration may give him in San Francisco and is at heart no more concerned now than when he was in the Cabinet about relieving the public of any of its burdens.

Former Secretary of the Treasury McAdoo who is anxious to become the heir apparent and who is telling what he would do to relieve the suffering public in the same gentleman who while in the Cabinet fought all efforts in Congress to have the compensation to the railroads under the railway control act held down to a moderate average. In large part because of his course then and as director of the railroad administration the public is now struggling to meet the railway administrations enormous deficit.

How much Bryan support does Senator Hitchcock expect to get for the presidency? How much administration support does the senator expect to get in view of the Hitchcock speech in Nebraska calling Mr. Wilson "an invalid, broken in health, depressed in spirit and bitterly disappointed and saying the President made errors in his course regarding the peace treaty? In other words,

isn't Mr. Hitchcock in about as close juxtaposition to the democratic presidential nomination as we are with Mars?
