MAKING A SPLURGE.

With all the talk of economy and the political freedom of the army and navy it does not sit well on the stomach of the average taxpayer to see the Democratic-national convention employ the navy as an adjunct to the big demonstration in San Francisco. It would be well for some of these apostles of reform to explain the reason for the marine corps presenting the convention with a staid of colors or why the navy was used to convey the secretary of the navy to a partisan demonstration. Had the Republicans suggested the appearance of a bodyguard from the Great Lakes training station near Chicago one can imagine the howl of derision that would have greeted the request but such action would not have been any greater imposition than for the Democrats to order the crews of warships to show up at the San Francisco gathering. The army and navy have always been held free from the taint of politics but the Democratic administration there appears utterly oblivious to the indecency of compelling enlisted men to parade for the delegation of one wing of the government.

ENLISTING AN ANGEL.

With E. L. Doheny and his millions entered as a possible candidate for the vice-presidency the managers of the Democracy seem to have a peculiarly subtle sense of the eternal fitness of things. After flaying the Chicago candidates for indulging in liberal primary expenses it is startling that the name of one of the richest men in the world should be dragged into the proceedings which cannot be more than a bid for a generous campaign contribution. Mr. Doheny was one of those dollar a day patriots who served with Barney Baruch and others of the same stripe for something more than the mere glory of serving their country. A millionaire is useful in a variety of ways when it comes to raising funds for conducting an election and it does not take a seer to anticipate that the mention of the oil magnate will be substantially required when it comes to strengthening the sinews of war. The Republican managers have resolved on a course in sharp contrast to the foregoing since they are raising their funds by popular contribution with \$5,000 as the limit on the very rich. The Republicans have neither officeholders nor statesmen wielding influence in contracts to reward them with rich donations and the decision of Senator Harding to make his campaign on the popular basis will be gratifying to the electors who are anticipating an early reinstatement of economy in the capital of the nation. In this connection it is laughable to observe the cry of retrenchment that has been raised by the Democrats through the dismissal of hundreds of employees. This fact is employed to emphasize the claim that the most rigid economy is being practised in Washington whereas the fact is that the dismissals of thousands of time servers is due to the action of the Republican majority in Congress in cutting down the appropriations for scores of useless departments.

HARDING AS AN ORATOR.

An effort has been made to picture Senator Harding as the comic paper type of country editor who is without honor in his own country without prestige or education. The modesty of the man makes him a target for the venomous shafts of his political opponents but a study of his speeches in Congress at a time when he was not thought of as possible presidential timber show that he has the eloquence of an Ingersoll with the grandeur of Christian sentiment. Here is a paragraph from his address on President McKinley delivered before the Ohio legislature on January 29, 1902: "If in the crowning wreaths of immortality there is a separate bloom for every noble achievement, then the angel of the south will place on William McKinley's brow the richest garland that has blossomed there. Great in life he was heroic in face of the eternal, and looked out grandly on the sea of the unknown. Face to face with a fate so bitter that it wrung the hearts of all civilization, he was the Christian martyr who yielded the life spark of a great manly heart to light the beacon fires that point the way to a life eternal."

ODDS AGAINST McADOO.

With the puppets of the San Francisco convention acting in strict obedience to the will of the sick man in the White House it does not seem probable by the most elastic stretch of imagination that Mr. Wilson would have the temerity to permit the nomination of a son in law to perpetuate the crown prince theory of government. Under the circumstances the nomination of the former secretary of the treasury would bear the family brand that would nauseate every American elector and bring home forcibly the principle of Imperialism for which the president has fought so strenuously. Nevertheless the opinion is growing that there is something more than an understanding between Wilson and McAdoo by which the latter would receive the nomination as the heir apparent to the throne at Washington. The ablest leaders of the party realize the peril of such a consummation which, under the circumstances, would spell disaster for the best ticket ever placed before the American people who will not stand for such perpetuation of an infamous nepotism. Daring as Wilson is in his public performances it is not likely that he will have the effrontery to stand for the nomination of a son in law. He is gifted with greater astuteness and the men behind the scenes say that he is playing for self and self alone. He will submit to the routine of honorary mention for the favorites of the party such as Cox, Palmer and McAdoo but when it comes to a showdown he will be the dusky horse to spring to the front and carry the convention off its feet. As one of the best known political writers in the convention puts it the session will resolve itself into a struggle to determine whether the king can be brought to abdicate in favor of the crown prince. If the long distance wires between the White House and the convention could be cut McAdoo would have the nomination. He is plainly the favor-

ite of the delegates who feel that it was under duress that he declined to permit his name to go before the convention. The feeling grows that Wilson expects the convention to nominate him for the third term. The positive withdrawal today of McAdoo strengthens this suspicion.

CHILE GROWING PROSPEROUS

SANTIAGO Chile, June 1.—The critical condition created to the main industry of Chile has been considerably bettered this year and the Nitrate Producers' Association has exported already 55,000 tons of nitrate against a production of only 55,000 tons which means that most of the surplus that could not be placed last year has found an easy market. The price of nitrate of soda has also increased considerably.

The prospects of this industry means for Chile solid financial situation of the government stimulus of work for laborers and general welfare of the country. The export was over 50,000 tons last year when there was no market for nitrate.
