STATION TO BE BENEFIT IN TONOPAH

Government Mining Bureau to Establish Experiment Station at Reno School

WILL BE HUGE STATE ASSET

Nevada Will be the Center of Research Work; Authorities to Come

RENO, July 12.—Addition of the United States bureau of mines experiment station to the University of Nevada is held by members of the faculty of the Mackay School of Mines to be one of the most important advances that the school has experienced in recent years.

President Clark announced that the whole energy would not be devoted to precious metals but that aid will be given in any of the problems that arise in the mines of the state if they are of sufficient note to warrant the bureau of mines making an investigation.

Particularly the new station will attack the problems of extracting the precious metals from their ores and determining the best method of treatment of the complex ores of such metals.

The Nevada legislature at its last session voted to appropriate \$30,000 for the construction of a building to house the experiment station, which at present is connected with the Colorado School of Mines at Golden, Colorado.

A tentative floor plan for the building has been drawn by F. J. DeLongchamps, state architect and has been approved by Secretary of the Interior Payne.

It is planned to make it an addition to the present east wing. It will be 40x65 feet and will be two stories high.

There will be from six to eight members of the research staff working in the laboratory when it is completed.
