CARDINALS NOW DRIVING AUTOS

(Correspondence of Associated Press) ROME, July 4.—One by one the bulwarks of conservatism in Europe disappear. The Vatican which preserves in its life and ceremonials so many picturesque customs and ancient ways of doing things for a long time sternly forbade the use of automobiles by cardinals and other ecclesiastics. Funeral looking carriages drawn by black horses conveyed the cardinals to and from the functions at St. Peter's, or to their visits to the pontiff in the Vatican palace. Now several of the cardinals, including the English Cardinal Gasquet, have motor cars which convey them everywhere.

Not so long ago the attendants in Elizabethan ruff and doublet and sword who marshal the spectators to their places in the great Vatican functions, did not allow the use of opera glasses to watch the wondrous scene. At the canonization of Joan of Arc a body of photographers were permitted to be present who took a film of the whole ceremony, so that when these picturesque historic processions no more occur, this reproduction will recall it.

FRANZ JOSEPH GIVEN PRAISE

(Correspondence of Associated Press) KEMPTEN, Bavaria, July 2.—England's late king, Edward VII, once tried to persuade Emperor Franz Joseph, of Austria, to break away from Germany, says General Conrad von Hotzendorff, former command-in-chief of the Austrian army. The general declared in a speech here the other day that the fidelity of Franz Joseph to the German-Austrian alliance had often been questioned, but in spite of many temptations he had remained faithful to the part.

"Fifteen years ago," he went on, "when I had just become chief of the general staff, the emperor remarked to me in his peculiar way, 'Do you know that King Edward has been visiting me at Ischl and earnestly trying to wean me away from our alliance with Germany?' But I refused. 'The emperor saw the war danger coming, but he kept true to the alliance, whose spirit still lives in our nation. What has existed for more than 20 years in peace and war will never die out. Such a country as Germany can never perish, and Austria will always stand by her side.'

ENGLISH MINISTERS DIE OF STARVATION

(Correspondence of Associated Press) LONDON, July 7.—At least 25 Protestant ministers are reported to have died of starvation in England last year, and the parsons have now formed the National Clerical Union for "establishment of a minimum living wage for the clergy." While it is announced the union will follow the trend of trade unionism the clergymen have declared they have no intention to strike to enforce their demands.

They will seek not only to establish a minimum wage but also deal with provisions for adequate retiring pensions, and pensions for widows and orphans of clergymen. Rev. C. H. Lloyd Evans, acting secretary of the new movement, said few of the "inferior clergymen" earned more than 300 pounds a year and a great many earned less. The union will seek to enlist the sympathy of the public.

BIG CONVENTION

(Correspondence of Associated Press) TOKIO, June 17.—Approximately 800 visitors are expected to come here to attend the International Sunday school convention to be held in Japan in June. When the convention was first announced 3000 foreigners were expected.

FASTING SEASON BEING OBSERVED

(Correspondence of Associated Press) CONSTANTINOPLE, June 28.—Moslems have just been observing Ramadan, a month of trials to all classes, especially to laboring men, who are supposed to go without food, drink and tobacco from sunup to sundown. Turkish restaurants are watched carefully by Mohammedan policemen, who are instructed to arrest customers and owners alike if any of the followers of Allah violate the laws of the koran. Consequently Christian restaurants, and especially those which have private rooms, become very popular with Mohammedans during the 28 days which are supposed to be given over to fasting and prayer.

Big guns are fired in Constantinople to indicate sundown and the rush of Turks to coffee houses and restaurants approaches a riot in Stamboul and other Turkish sections of Constantinople. Recently evening target practice by the British fleet has frequently been confused—many times intentionally—with the food gun and Moslems have broken their fast ahead of time.

Hot weather has made Ramadan especially trying, as the followers of the great prophet are not even supposed to drink water during daylight hours. Fasting makes the Turks so irritable and impatient that it is extremely difficult to transact business with them. Ramadan is a less trying period to Turkish men and women who are unemployed as they merely sleep through the day and turn night into a time of fasting. Throughout Ramadan all the minarets of Constantinople are ablaze with electricity. The Turkish streets are crowded at night, bands play everywhere and fireworks are discharged wherever the allied military officers do not prevent.

WILL PRESERVE CRUSOE'S CAVE

(Correspondence of Associated Press) HONOLULU, T. H., June 25 (By Mail)—Robinson Crusoe's cave may soon be converted into sleeping quarters for globe trotters, according to Prof. W. A. Bryan, vice-president of the Hawaiian Historical Society. The Hawaiian government, Mr. Bryan said recently is considering creating a national park and tourist resort on the island of Juan Fernandez named as the abode of Daniel De Foë's crazy character.

Modern hotels and other attractions would be covered on the island, according to plans being considered. The beauty and verdure of the island, Mr. Bryan says, is similar to the oldest part of the Hawaiian islands. Two nights were spent by Professor Bryan recently in Robinson Crusoe's cave. The professor is at present in the south seas seeking proof of his theory of an immense submerged continent in the Pacific.

COAL PRODUCTION IN FRANCE IS IMPROVED

(Correspondence of Associated Press) PARIS, July 7.—Gradual improvement in France's coal production, shown in figures brought out in the chamber of deputies, is giving comfort to economists, but is not counted upon to relieve the childlessness of homes so markedly affected factories for some time. The mines damaged by the German invasion are slowly being put in shape and it is expected that they will produce 250,000 tons monthly by the end of the year, if all goes well. This would be half the normal rate would not be reached for some years.

Difficulties in pumping out flooded mines and repairing dynamited shafts have proved the chief obstacles. Orders for machinery are accepted only for delivery in from four months to four years. Belgian firms finally have been engaged to aid in the reconstruction work after negotiations with Germans failed.

FEWER TOURISTS

(Correspondence of Associated Press) TOKIO, June 17.—Foreign visitors to Japan are decreasing in numbers, the Japan Tourist bureau has announced. Officials say most of the foreign residents of China, the South Seas and other parts of the orient, who formerly toured Japan in the summer, are going in their home lands this year. Feeling aggravated by the Shantung question has caused a marked decrease in the number of Chinese visitors, it is thought.

Cats and Dogs at Peace

MEXICAN TELLS U. S. ATTITUDE

(Correspondence of Associated Press) MEXICO CITY, July 8.—Senator Guillermo Laveaga declares in a statement he has just published that he believes the idea of American intervention in Mexico "very soon will be discredited and that this sole factor in creating hate and distrust between the two peoples will disappear forever."

Senator Laveaga endeavors to interpret to Mexicans the ideals of Americans, as one who formerly lived in the United States. In part he says: "I do not admit that American interventionists represent the national conscience of the American people. They represent only one class, the usurious capitalists. The honest and conscientious men who form the government never admit them to their deliberations."

"Neither do I admit that the American interventionists can deceive with their calumnies and false theories the laborious citizens of that republic. The American people are very credulous, but they have been deceived so often, they have suffered so much from the magnitude of the dollar that they know their methods, distrust them and tear and repudiate them. I have absolute faith in the moral personality of the American people."

MADE PROGRESS "I assert that Mexico in the last 10 years of civil war, has made more progress in cultivating civic spirit and has centered its progress on more solid bases than in all its previous years of existence as a nation. Naturally we must wait long for the world to recognize merit of this, but faith and justice, even tardily, always triumph, and will confound our gratuitous detractors with the malefaction of history."

We Mexicans are forming our codes, working out our destiny as a free nation. We are, naturally, making many errors. But do these justify other nations, simply because they are strong, in trampling upon our dignity as an independent people, in killing us? If this happens, we can cry, 'Might is right' and 'Doubtless land uber Alles'."

1000 IMMIGRANTS HANDLED IN DAY

(Correspondence of Associated Press) NEW YORK, July 24.—Hoffman Island, detention station at the New York quarantine service, now has an average transient population of more than 1000 a day, due to the inbound rush of Italian immigrants.

In addition, the five doctors attached to the station have given up all thoughts of vacation, and are working, one of the quarantine officials said, to the limits of human endurance, in examining, fumigating and inspecting prospective citizens and their families. The reason for the unusual call for the services of Hoffman Island is said to be a misunderstanding on the part of Italian officials and steamship companies respecting United States public health regulations. Travelers from districts where typhus and other transmissible diseases prevail are supposed to be "detained," examined and certified as "clean" by American public health officers before they board the ship.

IGNORE REGULATIONS These regulations are not being complied with, officials here claim, and therefore the detaining and fumigating must be done before the traveler is landed. The expense of this work, here is charged to the steamship companies. During the last week more than a half-dozen ships have arrived from ports where typhus-carriers, possibly could be taken on board. All of these ships have been detained at anchor, while the stevedores, numbering from one to 200 on each ship, were taken off in barges landed at Hoffman Island and detained for 24 to 48 hours.

During the detention they are compelled to take a thorough bath from the top of their heads to the soles of their feet. Their clothing, baggage and effects are put through a bath of live steam. From Hoffman Island arrivals are taken to Ellis Island for examination by immigration authorities as to their qualifications.

CAPTURES PRINCE

Up to June 4 she had danced eight times with the Prince of Wales. At the first Government House ball, soon after the prince reached Melbourne, he selected her as a dancing partner, unaided and without introduction. Miss Dix is the daughter of a public accountant. She "came out" two years ago.
