ORIENT TRAVEL IS DISLOCATED

(Correspondence of Associated Press) CONSTANTINOPLE, July 12.—Travel in the Levant has become so difficult that hotels in nearly all the larger cities are crowded with persons waiting for steamer and railway accommodations. Strikes in Bulgaria, Serbia and Italy, together with the lack of through trains have forced travelers to rely chiefly on steamers to French ports. JAPAN IMPORTS RICE TO FEED OWN FARMERS

(Correspondence of Associated Press) TOKIO, July 12.—The gravity of the food question in Europe finds its echo in Japan where the problem of how to feed the population, which is increasing annually by 600,000, is becoming yearly more pressing. Japan has ample living space for its people but cannot produce enough food for them, especially rice. Every bit of land is cultivated to the limit of its capacity. The land of Formosa, the island colony, is worked to its full capacity by the 2,000,000 Chinese farmers who cultivate the rice fields with great skill. In Korea, also, the grain harvest is considerable, though the failure of the Koreans to use fertilizers prevents greater harvests. To meet the food menace Japan, by a special arrangement with France, is making heavy rice imports from Indo-China. This is a costly operation, however, the Japanese government losing \$20,000,000 last year in supplying Indo-China rice to the Japanese people at a moderate price.

Legal and Judicial Events in the Career of Peter J. Somers, Candidate for Justice of the Peace

Judge Somers was admitted to practice his profession in the Supreme Court of the State of Wisconsin in January, 1884. In 1894 he was admitted to practice in the Supreme Court of the United States. In 1905 he was admitted to practice in the Supreme Court of the State of Nevada. In 1908 he was selected Judge of the Seventh Judicial District of the State of Nevada, and presided as such in the Counties of Esmeralda and Mineral until 1915. During his administration he tried all the jury cases at Goldfield, and all the criminal cases brought before the court. In Mineral County he likewise presided continuously as District Judge, during the time mentioned. During his incumbency of the office of District Judge, he also tried many cases in different counties of the state in the various judicial districts, such as Clark, Lincoln, Nye, Washoe and Elko Counties. In 1914 a series of damage suits were instituted at Goldfield in his court, aggregating over \$200,000. These cases, for the convenience of witnesses and parties, were transferred to Reno for trial, and Judge Somers presided at these trials. Two of the most important were tried and determined, and his decision in these two cases was adopted and used by the attorneys on both sides as the basis of settlement in all the others. Judge Somers' services were continuous from the time he assumed his duties until 1915, and the Supreme Court of the state was very considerate in passing on the opinions and decisions rendered by Judge Somers. Judge Somers states that were his experience on the bench and at the bar materially less, he would not offend the good people of Tonopah by obtruding his candidacy for Justice at this time and under the circumstances, in the coming election.

A solution to which the government is turning its attention is that of inducing the people to eat less rice and more wheat brought in the great wheat fields of Manchuria which would be ample as a food supply of the people would eat wheat. The enormous output of Manchuria is handled by the South Manchuria railway which at the same time transports yearly some 200,000 Chinese coolies from Shantung province to Manchuria, where they labor in the rice lands of the northern provinces.

LIFE INSURANCE FOR LIVESTOCK

(Correspondence of Associated Press) WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 5.—Life insurance for cows, sheep, pigs, horses and other livestock on the farm has been provided for in Italy by government decree. In the past, the Italian farmer carried all his livestock insurance with local mutual benefit insurance companies, which are unable financially to protect him against abnormal death rate due to plague or other calamity. Under the new decree branches of the National Institute for Local Insurance of Live Stock will be opened in all important centers, and its large funds will be available for insurance against normal as well as abnormal losses.
