**League of Nations
As Viewed by Woman**

Mr. White, chairman of the democratic national committee, has recently publicly stated that "the league question would be nothing more than a secondary issue in the campaign." That Governor Cox would "appeal to the voters on his record of advocacy of progressive measures." But soon after Governor Cox was nominated for the presidency he had a conference with President Wilson and each of them published a statement of the result of the conference. In his statement Mr. Wilson said: "I found what I already knew, and what Governor Cox has let the whole world know in his speech, that he and I are absolutely as one, with regard to the great issue of the league of nations." And in his statement Governor Cox said: "We are agreed as to the meaning and sufficiency of the democratic platform, and to the duty of the party in the face of the threat-

ened bad faith to the world in the name of America. "What he—Mr. Wilson—promised I shall, if elected, endeavor with all my strength, to give." I have republished these statements in order that the voters may realize that Governor Cox "is absolutely as one" with President Wilson in regard into the league issue, and that he has stated that if elected he would endeavor with all his strength "to give" what Mr. Wilson "promised." I now call public attention to the fact that the democratic party has virtually declared in its platform that it is opposed to the ratification of the league with the reservations for article 10 that republican and democratic senators have made, and that President Wilson has refused to accept. For if article 10 is ratified without these reservations it will obligate congress to declare war for the United States, when and against such nations as it is advised to declare at by officers of the league. And one of the constitutional powers of congress will be lost or given away.
