**JAPAN VISITED
BY CHINESE MEN**

TOKIO, July 21.—Japan is receiving the first visit of a party of Chinese newspaper men since feelings between the two nations became strained. With one exception all the members of the party are Canton men. Japan's trade with South China is steadily growing with Canton as the gate for Japanese goods. The party contains a journalist who was prominent in the anti-Japanese boycott in China, and the visit is welcomed as a sign of amelioration in the relations between the two countries.

**IMPORTS INTO
GERMANY LARGE**

BERLIN, July 26.—Since the raising of the blockade Germany has imported 10,000,000,000 marks' worth of silks, perfumes, chocolates, oranges, cigarettes and other luxuries from abroad, and the poor are clamoring for oatmeal and condensed milk, according to German advocates of "the simple life."

A new movement, known as the League for the Regeneration of Germany which preaches plain living and high thinking, a return to old-time simplicity, coupled with a revival of intellectuality as opposed to the crass materialism of the present day has been started here. It depreciates the daily issuance of 25,000,000 marks in paper currency by the government.

An appeal is made to the people to confine themselves to the essentials of life—no more foreign-made clothes or luxury foods, no more expensive pleasure trips abroad; no more costly presents.

It is claimed for the movement that it is entirely nonpartisan and that it has the official endorsement of the government.

**FRANCE SHOULD
DEVELOP CHINA**

**Former Premier Fears Germany
Will Gain Influence if
Not Closely Watched**

TOKIO, July 15.—Former Premier Paul Painleve of France, who stopped here on his way from America to China, was quoted as saying as he disembarked at Tokio:

"The peace of the world has nothing to gain from an Americanized or an Anglicized China. Without in any way meaning to offend our friends or allies, we feel that to the French belongs the moral obligation to encourage and develop the intellectual, scientific and technical relations which exist already between China and France."

"France must not fail, at this time, while China, seeking to modernize herself, is calling for intellectual guides and technical counselors, to answer that call. Anything that fails to prevent French culture to China leaves the way open for German Kultur, to our hurt."

M. Painleve said his mission to China, which is his destination, had nothing to do with finance, but was purely educational, scientific and technical, with the idea of laying a foundation for a more thorough knowledge of the far east. Above all it was his aim to guide toward France the Chinese who are seeking a higher education.

**AUSTRIANS HAVE
BUMPER CROPS**

VIENNA, July 24.—Bountiful crops of early fruit and vegetables and ever but in his gracious weather their need is not so keenly felt. Meats are scarce and high beyond reach of the masses. The promise of an abundance of harder later yields from field and orchard, with the big American flour credit still available for the ration of daily bread, have given Austria a reprieve from the terrible hardships of last winter.

Fats are as scarce as ever, how American flour credit will be exhausted before the winter sets fairly in and no man in Austria knows from where or by what means it will be replaced.

**SPANISH WAR MEN
MAY GET PENSIONS**

Chief of Police J. D. Grant is in receipt of a letter concerning the pension bill for Spanish-American war veterans which was recently signed by the president. The notice is directed to all ex-soldiers who served in the war against Spain or in the Philippines insurrection or the China relief expedition or their widows. It continues:

"The late congress has passed laws of the utmost interest to the above class of soldiers, and if they will send name and address to Walter S. Buchanan, national aide-de-camp, Army and Navy Union, Route 2, Lombard, Va. he will be glad to advise you fully as to your rights under the new law. Prompt action will mean the possible saving of money as the pension begins from the filing of the claim. Mr. Buchanan is also a member of the General Nelson A. Miles camp, United Spanish War Veterans, and the president's own garrison of the Army and Navy Union, and wishes to assist his comrades in every possible manner."
