Crosscut Has Already Been Driven Eighty Feet From Merger Shaft

The new Kewanas crosscut on the 825-foot level of the Merger shaft has been advanced 80 feet toward the St. Ives vein, which will be reached in 40 feet, according to estimates. The Kewanas holds under lease from the Deep Mines a large acreage from the surface to the 1000-foot level. The lease says the Goldfield Tribune is for four years, from August 1, the Kewanas to pay 15 per cent royalty after freight and treatment charges have been deducted.


