ODDIE-A VOTE GETTER

ATTENTION, REPUBLICANS!
Who, among the Republican senatorial candidates, can most certainly win the election?
In the case of former Governor Oddie there are no uncertain elements. Past elections prove the future.
In 1910, Oddie was elected governor by a vote of 10,435, and his plurality was 1637. His vote exceeded those of the Republican candidates for senate and congress by 656 and 569 respectively.
In the Democratic year of 1914, Oddie's vote in the state outside of Washoe county, exceeded the vote for the Republican candidates for senate and congress by 783 and 64 respectively.
Owing to local issues in 1914, Oddie received in the Republican county of Washoe but 1460 votes as against his opponent's 2247 votes. A reversal of Washoe's vote would have elected Oddie by 500.
Four years later, 1918, Washoe swung back for Oddie with the magnificent vote of 3334 as against 2615 for his same opponent in 1914.
In 1918 a Democratic landslide in Nevada in which the average plurality of seven Democratic candidates, outside of governor, was 4206, Oddie was defeated by but 1039 votes. Oddie's vote exceeded the average vote of seven other defeated Republican candidates by 2349.
The Democratic candidate for the senate, whose plurality was 4134, received in 1918 but 352 more votes than did Oddie. The votes were: Henderson, 12,197; Oddie, 11,845.
If Henderson could get only 352 more votes than Oddie in a Democratic landslide, where will he get off with Oddie as his opponent in the Republican year 1920?
The vote of Nevada may and probably will determine whether the next senate will be Republican or Democratic.
It is imperative that Republicans think and vote wisely. This is no time for experiment.
