

# TAHITIANS BEST "HULA" DANCERS

 Papeete, Tahiti, Sept. 10.—Dancing girls of Papeete won a prize of 1000 francs given the best hula dancers at a recent celebration here. Songs which originated years before the first white man sighted the islands were chanted at the celebration. There were songs of the poi poi feast, songs of kava drinking, chants of war, and love ballads of the Polynesians. People of the islands do not sing their folk songs as they do in other countries. Instead of each singing the same notes in unison, there are at least 20 different parts, ranging from a low undertone by men to shrill calls by the older women and light melodies by the girls.

# THEATRICAL MAN WILL RETIRE

 Berlin, Sept. 10.—The newspapers announce the retirement of Max Reinhardt from the active management of his chain of Berlin theatres. Reinhardt, who has dominated the German dramatic world for more than 15 years, is said to be disgusted at his inability to induce the authorities to repeal or modify the amusement tax which, he states, is burdening his enterprises to a point where they are no longer profitable. He will retire to his country seat near Salzburg, where he will devote himself to agriculture and some more complicated problems of dramatic art. Gerhart Hauptmann, a dramatist, and Felix Hollaender, who has been Reinhardt's chief assistant, are mentioned as the joint succeeding directors.

# COTTON TO BECOME A NEVADA INDUSTRY

Cotton in the Las Vegas valley promises a very prolific production, judging by the appearance of the fields at this time. On the Winterwood ranch of Charles S. Sprague the cotton is almost as high as a man's head, and the plants are all bearing a large number of bolls. On one plant 132 bolls of cotton are shown. The fact that the plants send out squares close to the ground is said to be an advantage which Las Vegas and some other localities possess, not common to all cotton growing sections. In all localities where tried in this valley, the Pima long staple variety of cotton seems to be right at home and Mr. Sprague is fully convinced, not only by his own experience and the opinion of others, that Clark county will become a very successful long staple cotton section.—Las Vegas Age


