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TOMORROW WILL DECIDE

Tomorrow the voters of Nevada must register their preference for the Republican or Democratic ticket. At the same time the voters of the nation will make a similar decision. The national verdict is no longer a matter of doubt. All signs point to the election of Warren G. Harding as president by a landslide of unprecedented magnitude. This result is admitted by leading Democrats throughout the country and the question that remains in Nevada is whether this state shall continue to be represented by Charles Henderson, whose record in congress consists of doing nothing, or whether it shall put itself in the position where it can expect favors from the Republican administration through being represented by Tasker L. Oddie in the senate and Samuel S. Arentz in the house. It is essential that both houses of congress should be Republican to bring about the needed policies of real progress which this country has been waiting for so many months, and to enter upon the program of reconstruction which is sponsored by the Republican candidates.

So far as Nevada is concerned it is a question of how can this state profit most. The policies of the Republican party are directed towards fostering the industries of Nevada. A protective tariff is used to encourage the development of the agricultural interests in this state—a safe and sane policy toward business such as is promulgated by the Republicans is necessary if this state is to secure the capital needed in the development of its mining industry. Irrigation projects are going to be built during the next four years and Nevada can expect more in this line if she is represented by a Republican senator and representative than she can if she returns the Democratic candidates. Every voter in the state who desires to see Nevada's industries advance and the state prosper as it deserves should make certain that its representatives at Washington be of the same political party as the president.

When it comes to the personal qualifications of the candidates, Nevada should feel proud that she has candidates this year such as Tasker L. Oddie and Samuel S. Arentz. Both Mr. Oddie and Mr. Arentz are men of the highest standing in the communities in which they live. Both have been among the builders of the state and many works stand as monuments to their enterprises. They advocate a straight-out Republican policy which will secure for this state the things it needs to make it prosperous. The records of both have stood the test of time and they have come unscathed through the attacks of their opponents. Both men during their residence in Nevada have had much to do with the employment of labor and they have the enviable record of always being absolutely fair with their employes. Both have held many positions of trust within this state and they have a record of unimpeachable honesty in the performance of their duties. These are the men for whom the Republicans are asking support in tomorrow's election and every voter should remember that a vote for Oddie and Arentz is a vote for Nevada. A vote against them is a vote against the deepest interests of this state.

WHAT THE VETERAN REMEMBERS

Little has been heard during the campaign as to how the veteran of the world war is going to vote. The Democrats have realized that at no time was there any doubt as to how the great majority of those who served in the armed forces of their country would cast their ballots in this election. Above everything else, these veterans love the United States and they do not propose to stand for any bargaining away of its freedom through the establishment of the supergovernment of the league of nations. The veteran knows now that throughout the war his comfort and safety were sacrificed to the interests of the scoundrelly slacker and the infamous profiteer. He knows that his comfort in the training camps and his safety on the battlefield were sacrificed by the incompetent administration of Secretary Baker and President Wilson. He knows and resents that billions were wasted in aircraft and munitions and that he had to depend upon the allies for food, weapons and ammunition. He knows that he froze in the mud while President Wilson visited throughout Europe and was feted by the king of England. He knows that \$640,000,000 was appropriated for aircraft and at the same time he remembers attacks by German airplanes against which he had no defense but his rifle. He remembers the absolute lack of American fighting planes. He remembers and resents the fact that Secretary Baker coddled the pacifist and the slacker and only lately has refused to make public the names of the slackers. He remembers the treatment by the war department of the conscientious objectors who not only were set free without a dishonorable discharge but were given the same pay he received for serving his country faithfully. He remembers how the president's ship remained inactive in the harbor at Brest for days, while Mr. Wilson discussed the peace treaty, and how the hospitals of that same city were overcrowded with American wounded, who would have given their very souls to get back home. These are only some of the things he remembers and the veterans are going to cast an overwhelming vote against the entire Democratic administration and its candidate, Mr. Cox.

The record which Judge Ben W. Coleman has made as justice of the supreme court of Nevada should draw to him the support of every voter in the state in his race for re-election. Judge Coleman has been impartial in his decisions, is recognized as an honest, efficient and faithful servant of the people, and has made a record of disposing of business which is a credit to himself and to the state. His opinions have been widely quoted in the law journals of this country and several of them have been chosen by publishers of selected cases. His standing among the members of the profession, his scholarly attainments and his wide knowledge of the law qualify him well for a place as a member of the supreme court of this state and most certainly entitle him to another term in the office he is seeking.

ROOSEVELT AIDS IN LODGE RESERVATIONS

NEW YORK, Oct. 30.—Former President Theodore Roosevelt helped to draw up the Lodge reservations to the league of nations covenant, declared Mrs. Corinne Roosevelt Robinson, sister of Mr. Roosevelt, in an address here Thursday night.

"When Theodore Roosevelt was ill in Roosevelt hospital, Senator Lodge wrote asking if he could see him," said Mrs. Robinson, "and my brother asked me to let him know he would be welcome. So Senator Lodge made a night trip to New York and every one of the reservations for which Governor Cox has called Senator Lodge an arch-conspirator and traitor, was arranged in this conference and approved by Theodore Roosevelt."

SMUGGLE OPIUM IN BONES OF HAMS

(Correspondence of Associated Press) SHANGHAI, Oct. 1.—Probably the most novel of the many queer methods employed to smuggle opium and narcotic drugs into the international settlement of Shanghai was brought to light recently when customs officers seized about 200 pounds of prepared opium that had been packed into the hollowed-out rear bones of a shipment of 350 hams that arrived as a part of a ship's cargo.

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ESMERALDA VOTERS NUMBER ABOUT 1150

It is estimated that, eliminating the names of voters who were registered two years ago and who have left Esmeralda county since then, there are about 1150 registered voters now residing in the county, says the Tribune. The official registration for the general election is 1701, which includes those registered for the last election, but who since have left the county. These names cannot be removed from the registration list until after the coming election. Eighty-six names have been added since the primaries, according to H. C. Roberson, county clerk.
