

# BOSTON PLANS THRIFT CLUBS

(By Associated Press.)  
 BOSTON, Nov. 2.—An organization to promote thrift and to protect savings has been incorporated here as an outgrowth of the wartime conservation campaigns and the recent Ponzi high finance fiasco. It will be known as the Association for the Promotion and Protection of Savings and will combine with the encouragement of safe investment an educational program to combat quick-rich schemes.

At the head of the association is Alfred L. Miken, former governor of the federal reserve bank in this city. Those associated with him include leaders in the thrift Liberty loan and other campaigns of recent years. The association will co-operate with the work of the savings division of the treasury department but its activities will be distinct from any government branch.

The educational department will be divided into school and home economic sections. The former covering education in thrift in colleges, public schools, parochial, normal and vocational schools, and the latter working with women's organizations, fraternal bodies, the army and navy, the churches, and professions.

# PLAN ACTIVE POLO SEASON

 DEL MONTE, Calif., Nov. 2.—Capt. H. H. Holmes, western polo referee, has been engaged to handle the play in the Del Monte Midweek and San Mateo tournaments this coming season.

For the past few years, players have complained of the failure of officials to enforce rules and discipline. Some of the main players, it is said, were beginning to acquiesce such faults as carelessness and dangerous crossing with their mounts.

With the prospect of the international players, as well as those of Honolulu, Mexico and other distant points, coming to California this winter, it was deemed advisable to get the best possible officials. Captain Holmes has an international reputation.

Captain Holmes has gone to England to get a line on the team that will defend the cup against Alberca. He will return in December and will come down to Del Monte in January to get into action. The local referee is lining up a number of players who will come out with him.

The California polo season opens at Del Monte with an invitational tournament on January 29.

# KAISER LIKES MADE IN GERMANY SIGN

 AMERHONGEN, Holland, Nov. 2.—The "Made in Germany" sign is still a fetish to the former German emperor. Though he is reported to feel that his country treated him shamefully, nevertheless he continues to buy for himself and his little court at Doorn German goods, sent direct from Berlin when possible, notwithstanding the fact that he has been in Holland nearly two years. This was most recently demonstrated when, in furnishing the little hospital William has had built here as a memorial of his stay in Amerhongen, he had practically every stick of furniture and other equipment sent from Berlin.

# BLIGHT FREE PEARS FOUND

 GRASS VALLEY, CALIF., Nov. 1.—The world's largest stock of pear seedlings of a wild, blight-resisting variety found in Manchuria, is located on the Loma Rica ranch near Grass Valley. The young trees are from seed brought directly from China and number about 100,000.

Three pomological experts from the U. S. department of agriculture, Professors Allison Wright and Kinsman, recently inspected the stock and approved the experimental work. The original trees are found growing in the ancient burying grounds of the kings of the Manchurian dynasty and it is only since the discovery of the dynasty that the seeds became available. The tract is said to be vast and to be grown in trees of immense size.

By grafting the commercial varieties of pears upon this stock good results are expected to be obtained.

# AUSTRIAN FINANCES ARE IN BAD SHAPE

 VIENNA, Oct. 31.—A government deficit for the current year of 12,000,000 crowns is admitted by the finance department. Other estimates however place it at a much larger figure. In view of the constant demands of state employees for increased wages and allowances when the government could not pay.

As a result of a delegation of five senators the government admitted that there were 60,000 more employees on the payroll at present than were covered in the estimates. Also it was confessed that it was next to impossible to reduce the list and throw these people into the ranks of the unemployed with the approach of winter.

# INCOME TAX IN HAWAII LARGE

 HONOLULU, T. H., Oct. 16.—Addition of three small words in the territorial income tax law will add \$1,000,000 to Hawaii's revenue next year, according to Governor Charles J. McCarthy who says he will make an effort to see that the law and collect territorial taxes on amounts paid out in federal income taxes.

# MILLERAND LOOKS LIKE ROOSEVELT

 PARIS, Oct. 13.—President Millerand greatly resembles physically the late Colonel Theodore Roosevelt. He has the same broad chest, short thick-set stature, the twinkling blue eyes look strikingly at one from thick lenses, the same large head, strong, powerful neck, the same capacity for hard work.

At Versailles, after Millerand had been officially invested with the powers of president of the French republic, the correspondent of the Associated Press was one of a large group of newspaper men with whom the president shook hands. "How do you feel, Mr. President?" the correspondent asked. "Splendid!" Millerand faintly shouted. Somehow, the word sounded very much like one heard years ago: "Bully."

The exports during the month aggregated Y. 174,487,000 and the imports Y. 122,645,000.

## LEPER COLONY WILL BE FILMED

 HONOLULU, T. H., Oct. 16.—Kalapapa settlement, the famous leper colony on the island of Molokai is to be filmed, but the films are to be used only for educational purposes in the Hawaiian islands and it is doubtful if ever they will be shown outside the territory, according to Dr. F. E. Trotter, president of the territorial board of health. According to Dr. Trotter, it is expected that the pictures will go far towards educating the people to a true understanding of what the board of health is doing and the necessity for all leprosy suspects undergoing treatment which holds out great possibilities of a cure.

## HEAVY AXES ARE PAID BY KAISER

 DOORN, Holland, Oct. 15.—The village of Doorn now begins to look upon the former German emperor as a welcome guest. His residence here, under the new tax assessment levied on the exile, is expected to increase the town's income by about \$13,365 annually, being about 25 per cent of the entire municipal tax receipts of Doorn. This is the municipal share of the anticipated revenue from taxation of William's income, which the Dutch government has estimated at the normal equivalent of \$522,600 annually.

## HOCKEY REFEREE IS SNOWBOUND
