 The Twelfth Federal reserve district has reported per capita sales of war savings securities, January 1 to September 20, 1920, as follows:
 Alaska, \$135; Arizona, 30; California, 40; Idaho, 28; Nevada, 69; Oregon, 77; Washington, 56; Hawaii, 68, an average of 407.
 The total amount of securities purchased in this district was \$3,290,996.47, of which Nevada's share was \$68,352.62. The monthly average was \$365,845.16, and Nevada's monthly average was \$7594.73.
