NEW YORK, Nov. 13.—The steamers Montserrat and San Carlos collided near the Statue of Liberty today. They were carrying a large number of passengers. Many leaped overboard. One was injured in leaping to a tug, but no others were hurt.

CHICAGO, Nov. 13.—Judge Landis, the new dictator of organized baseball, received the minor league managers today, who congratulated him and wished him well.

RENO SCHOOLS GROW RAPIDLY

The Reno school board has secured an option on the Nevada hotel property, with a price set at \$22,000, says the Journal. This option is good until some time in December, so that a mass meeting may determine public opinion relative to the need of increasing housing of the Reno schools.

At the present time there is a decided lack of proper school housing, and it is necessary to erect more school buildings, and create a junior high school. The Nevada hotel property, due to its central location, would make an ideal site for a junior high school, in the opinion of Superintendent of Schools B. D. Billingshurst.

Eight lots are included in the property, and arrangements may be made to purchase them by paying down \$5000 and the remainder in equal payments over a course of several years. This would permit the school board to purchase the property without increasing the school taxes.

NEEDS RAIL CONNECTION

Yerington needs, and before many months have passed, will demand, adequate rail connection with both the main line railroads and our own interior territory. The first requirement will be a terminal within the city limits, which the Copper Belt officials state will cost \$100,000. This figure will no doubt shrink somewhat under close scrutiny. The service accorded by the Copper Belt to the Smith Valley and Sweetwater sections is an invaluable asset in the upbuilding of the city of Minden. And P. H. Cook believes that the road should be exempted from taxation because of the immense benefits it confers on Lyon county.—Yerington Times.

SPANISH BELT EX WILL SELL STOCK

Jules Barnd, president of the Consolidated Spanish Silver Belt Mining company, writes from Toledo, Ohio, that the Spanish Belt Extension Mining company, which owns adjoining property, has received a permit from the securities department of Ohio to sell 150,000 shares of treasury stock to net the company \$50,000. The money will be used for the development of the property.

TONOPAH BEATS BISHOP 16 TO 0

According to a wire received late this afternoon, the Tonopah high school football team won by the score of 16 to 0 in their game with the high school at Bishop today. This is the second victory of Tonopah over the Bishop team, the local boys having defeated the other team by a score of 7 to 0 here on October 30. No details of the game were given in the wire.

FLEETS TO MAKE JOINT CRUISE

NEW YORK, Nov. 13.—The Atlantic and Pacific fleets will make a joint cruise to the west coast of South America in February. The fleets will join at Balboa and proceed to Callao, Peru. They will return to Balboa on February 25 and engage in an athletic meet.
