JAP AGITATORS WANT WAR

Representative Kahn of California States That Only Politicians, Agitators and Demagogues of Japan Want War

By Associated Press. WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 9.—Discussing the Japanese question freely and frankly in a carefully prepared address in the house today, Representative Julius Kahn of California, chairman of the military committee, declared that America hoped always to avoid war, but that if the "statesmen, the publicists, the politicians, the agitators and demagogues of Japan" really wanted war with the United States, they will be the ones to bring it on, and not the Americans.

COPPER MINE WAGES REDUCED. KNOXVILLE, Tenn., Dec. 9.—The Tennessee Copper Company and the Dicktown Sulphur Copper Iron Company, both with large copper mining operations at Copper Hill, announced wage reductions of ten per cent.

FUNDS FOR CHINA RELIEF. WASHINGTON, Dec. 9.—President Wilson has invited a number of prominent Americans to form a committee to obtain funds for famine relief in China.

BIG WAGE REDUCTION. BOSTON, Dec. 9.—A wage reduction of twenty-two and one-half per cent in the textile mills of New England and New York State was forecast in a statement issued after a conference of textile manufacturers. The industry employs 300,000 persons.

EX-CONVICT IS NEAR DEATH IN SANTA ROSA JAIL

SANTA ROSA, Cal., Dec. 9.—Indications of a critical period were present in the condition of George Boyd, the ex-convict, accused of the murder of three peace officers who were rounding up San Francisco gangsters here Sunday, and who was shot in the abdomen by Detective Jackson of San Francisco, one of the slain officers.

Boyd is in the county jail, the authorities fearing to move him because of threatened mob violence.

POETS CONTEST FOR BIG PRIZES

BUENOS AIRES, Dec. 9.—Poetry championship contests will be held in Buenos Aires in 1921, with the poets of all Latin America invited to participate and prizes amounting to about \$44,000 gold to be distributed. The tournament of verse, called in Spanish "Juegos florales," or "flower games," is being organized by the young women's committee of the Argentine Patriotic league.

Through the Argentine diplomats in all Spanish-speaking American countries, poets from every part of the hemisphere will be invited to take part, those who receive the prizes being invited to come to Argentina at the expense of the association.

THUGS TAKE MONEY; RETURN HERO MEDAL

CONNELLSVILLE, Pa., Dec. 9.—While a negro woman held up Mrs. Annabelle Gemas, along the West Penn street car line near the Gemas home, two negroes searched her, took her pocketbook containing about \$30, but returning a gold service medal which the woman's husband the late George Gemas, had been awarded for service in the Spanish-American war.

RECOGNITION APPEAL NOT TO BE FORCED

By Associated Press. MEXICO CITY, Dec. 9.—Efforts to obtain recognition by the United States of the Avrogon regime in Mexico will not be carried on as actively as they were under the administration of Adolfo de la Huerta, it is indicated here.

Oregon is declared to be inclined to allow his administration during the next few months to act on his appeal for recognition.

30 MOROS KILLED IN ISLAND BATTLE. MANILA, P. I., Dec. 9.—Thirty Moros were killed in Balu island in a battle with the Philippine constabulary, growing out of efforts to encourage education of children, said official advices from the governor of Jolo today.

MAY DECLARE AN EARLY TRUCE

Lloyd George States that Prospects for Early Settlement Are Brighter Than They Appear on the Surface

LONDON, Dec. 9.—The prospect of an Irish truce, which last night was regarded as having receded almost out of sight, has been revived, according to the Daily Mail, as a result of a private interview between Monsignor Patrick Joseph Cuneo, bishop of Perth, and Lloyd George yesterday. The Daily Mail quotes the premier as saying "It may definitely be stated that prospects for a settlement are much brighter than they appear on the surface."

LIVERPOOL, Dec. 9.—Prior to sailing for New York, Sir Horace Plunkett, chairman of the Dublin convention, said "I see no hope for a truce in Ireland nor any hope in the overtures reported in the press. There cannot be peace while there is feignfulness committed by both sides. In my judgment, the British government is to blame if people knew how many persons have been killed in Ireland we would soon have peace."

CHINESE ORDER THE ARREST OF GENERAL CHANG

By Associated Press. PEKING, China, Dec. 9.—General Chang Ching-yao, whose troops murdered Rev. W. A. Reimert, missionary of the Reformed Church mission at Yochow, last June, and for whose trial and punishment the American legation has been pressing the Chinese foreign office, is reported to have escaped from China and gone to Japan.

In response to the legation's representations, the Chinese authorities had ordered the arrest of General Chang, and he was alleged to be in the custody of General Wang Chang-yuan, military governor of Hupeh, pending trial. He already had been required to pay over to the mission an indemnity of \$45,000. The legation is now informed that General Chang has secretly left China.

BRITISH MAY NOT PERMIT AMERICA COMMUNICATION

C., Dec. 9.—Hope that the decision of the British government not to permit a special committee of Americans to visit Irish territory to obtain information about conditions in Ireland is not final, is expressed in a letter sent to the British embassy by a commission of the committee of 100 investigating the Irish question.

The commission's letter to the embassy said "It would seem to imply automatic interference on the part of the government with the free communication of friendly people."

WOMEN RECEIVE OXFORD DEGREES

3 ELECTROCUTED AS AUTO FALLS ON WIRE

STURGEON BAY, Wis., Dec. 9.—Three persons were electrocuted here when their automobile plunged over a bridge and struck an electric wire carrying 23,000 volts. The car fell 15 feet into a creek bed and two feet of water, carrying the wire with it.
