

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

FREIBURG MINE LOOKED UPON AS PRODUCER

Frank Macey, who for a number of years was a resident of Tonopah, and who is now engaged in developing a property at Freiburg, in Lincoln county, arrived here Wednesday from the south, and in talking with a representative of The Bonanza had the following to say regarding the district in which he is interested.

"At present we are developing ore on three claims, and thus far results have been greater than were our expectations when we first started. On the Parrot No. 3 claim, 25 feet of a vein has been opened, showing a grade of ore that can be shipped at a handsome profit. On the Parrot No. 2, 400 feet south, we have 12 feet of ore. Parrot No. 1, 300 feet south, showing wonderful values, and to date we have only a cut 17x12x5 feet. The entire cut is in ore. While doing the annual work on the Parrot No. 4 we uncovered a sulphide ore that assayed 14 ounces of silver and 14 per cent lead. The dimensions of this vein are undetermined, as we have only prospected the ledge. Most of the ore lies between the line and porphyry.

"Our company, the Combination Division, secured these holdings at Freiburg after an exhaustive sampling had taken place and we are to be congratulated on getting hold of this group, as indications point to it as one of the biggest producers in the state. Freiburg was discovered in 1868 by C. C. Goodman and was held and mined by him until 1873, when silver dropped to the lower level. During this period a shaft 85 feet was sunk and \$85,000 extracted therefrom, making the production of \$1000 a foot. The district is three miles in length and two miles wide, with mineral showing on all parts of the area. The Freiburg is located about 134 miles south of Tonopah and 14 miles from Sharp.

Mr. Macey stated that the general average of the ore runs better than \$30 per ton.

MAKING IMPROVEMENTS
Many improvements have been made in the local Wells-Fargo office during the past two weeks. A new safe has been installed, the rear storage room has been extended 20 feet and the entire interior given a coat of paint. The office now presents an up-to-date appearance.

JAPAN BUILDING BIG FORTRESSES

(By Associated Press) TOKIO, Dec. 10.—The Japanese army, attaching great importance to stronger military defense arrangements in the Pacific, asked for an appropriation of the equivalent of \$1,230,000 at the last session of the diet, and the program has been already put into execution.

The greatest part of the credit will be expended the current year in the reconstruction and repairs of fortresses. Several new fortresses are expected to be built on the Pacific coast and other parts of the empire in the next few years. Of the two new fortresses to be built this year one will be on Chichijima island, one of the Mackijo group, off Izu, just outside Tokio bay, and the other on Oshima island, off Kagoshima.

POWERFUL NAVY PLAN OF JAPAN

(By Associated Press) TOKIO, Dec. 10.—The keel of the new battle cruiser Amagi, the largest in the Japanese navy, is to be laid soon at the Yokosuka navy yard. The Amagi will be the nucleus of the eight battleship and eight cruiser squadron to be completed in the several ensuing years and will have a displacement of over 41,000 tons.

On her completion the Amagi will be a powerful addition to the Japanese navy, together with another superdreadnought, the Akagi, which will be a sister vessel. The keel of the Akagi will be laid at the Kure navy yard this month. The new battleships, Matsuyama and Nagato, which were built at Yokosuka and Kure respectively, and are receiving armaments, are expected to be completed and ready for commission shortly.

REPEAL POWERS OF PRESIDENT

(By Associated Press) NEW YORK, Dec. 10.—One of the first acts of the new administration will be to make peace with Germany and repeal the war-time powers of the president, Senator Lenroot of Wisconsin, told the annual convention of International Garment Manufacturers here today.
