REFUGEES DYING AT RATE OF 35 EACH DAY

(By Associated Press.)
 NEW YORK, Jan. 6.—Six thousand Greek refugees at Batumi, Transcaucasia, their clothing worn to shreds, are dying like wild animals in dens and dying at the rate of from 35 to 50 a day, writes Dr. W. E. Rambo, a New East Relief worker, of West Philadelphia, Pa., in a report from the Black sea port received here.

In what he calls a tragic episode that bids to become historic, Dr. Rambo says the Greek government already has repatriated 20,000 who emigrated from the near east to colonize Thrace and that from 10,000 to 12,000 remain to be transported from Batumi back to their homeland. Most of these, he says, are physically strong, but 6,000 refugees from other regions who flocked to Batumi in the expectation of relief have been in that city five months, waiting in vain for help, their condition daily becoming more desperate on account of the rigors of the present Georgian winter.

The Greek government, Dr. Rambo explains, disclaiming responsibility for the plight of the people, has undertaken through humane considerations only to feed and doctor the refugees but, so far, has declined to transport them to Greece on the ground that there is insufficient housing there to shelter them.

Meanwhile, the letter says, "the 6,000 are overcrowded in barracks unfit for human habitation. The families have no privacy. Some are lying in bed day and night because they have no clothing to protect them from the cold, or cover their nakedness. Unless speedy relief comes to these people most of them will die during the winter. Already the remnants of the original refugees are in despair. One of them said to me: 'We are no longer waiting for ships; we are waiting for death.' Of 5767 in this party in the beginning only about 2400 remain—3367 are dead. Another party of 6800 has 2800 survivors; 4000 are dead. Of the survivors 700 are ill."

HOUSE MEMBERSHIP IS TO HAVE 500 LIMIT

 WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 6.—The house census committee agreed to report to congress the Siegel bill fixing membership in the house at 433, an increase of 48. The bill also recommended passage of a constitutional amendment limiting future membership in the house to 500.

The basis for representation was fixed at one member for every 218,579 inhabitants. Under the bill California would gain five members. No state would lose any representation.

JAP SOCIALISTS DISPLAY ACTIVITIES

 TOKIO, Jan. 6.—Japanese Socialists are displaying considerable activity and are being closely watched by the police. Plans were recently discovered to form an international socialist society covering Japan, China, Korea and Siberia.

FLORIDA SHIPPER OF FINE XMAS CELERY

 SANFORD, Fla., Jan. 6.—New grown celery for the Christmas trade was shipped out of Florida earlier this year than ever before, due principally to a new kind originated in this section. Through long experimenting a strain of seed has been developed which matures much earlier than any other kind and is almost entirely free from blight and other diseases that attack early celery.

GIRL LOSES BIG LIBEL SUIT AGAINST FATHER

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Jan. 6.—A suit for \$50,000 damages brought by Mrs. Virginia Saucer against her father, Joseph L. Giroux, millionaire mining operator of Los Angeles and Marietta, Nevada, "for the vindication" of the names of her brother, George L. Giroux, whom the millionaire admitted having slain at Marietta, last spring, and of her mother, also deceased, was thrown out of court here by Superior Judge Charles Burnell.

The judge sustained a demurrer to the complaint on the ground the law does not afford civil action relief for a reputed libel of the dead.

Mrs. Saucer alleged her father caused to be published in a newspaper a statement that "it was not my son that I killed."
