### CHAPLAIN DOCUMENTS MAY CAUSE TROUBLE

(By Associated Press)  
DUBLIN, Ireland, Jan. 8.—The statements "Likely to cause dissatisfaction to His Majesty" in documents alleged to have been written by Father Dominick, chaplain to the late Lord Mayor MacSwiney of Cork and to have been in possession of Father Dominick, were read at the opening of his trial by the left general of the court martial.

He was chaplain of the Republican navy and spiritual adviser to the late Lord Mayor during his confinement and at the time of his death in Brixton prison from the effects of a hunger strike.

### DRESS REFORM OF JAPS IS PROTESTED

Naga, Japanese vice-consul, aroused such a storm of protest against any movement to force the Japanese women to abandon their native dress that the vice-consul has announced no efforts along this line will be attempted.

High Americans and Japanese protested the implied suggestion that the picturesque costumes of the Japanese women be abolished in Honolulu and consequently, Mr. Naga has stated that the plea to his countrywomen will ask only that they dress neatly, the choice of American or Japanese style being left to themselves.

### FIRE CHIEF MAY BE APPOINTED NEXT WEEK

### SOLDIER BONUS BILL AMOUNTS \$18,000,000

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—The Washington state bonus to soldiers in the world war, voted at the National Convention, will cost \$18,000,000.

James H. Davis, chairman of the administration committee of the lower house of the state legislature, announced yesterday when the bill was originally drawn it was estimated that \$11,000,000 would be required. He Davis said that the heavy requirements of the bonus bill will make it necessary to cut all state appropriations as sharply as possible.

### DEMOCRAT UPHOLDS JAPS

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 8.—Representative Welty, Democrat of Ohio, attacked Governor Stephens of California for sending a letter bearing on the Japanese problem in California. Welty declared he was surprised "to find a governor carrying on propaganda of misrepresentation with the hope of establishing a special national laundry to wash the dirty linen of the state."

Welty declared that some of the governor's statements could hardly be justified by the 1920 census figures, and added "No unbiased mind can quite understand the settlement of your land question in prohibiting land ownership by Japanese when the question could have been settled without giving offense and just as effectively by making it unlawful for any alien to own land."

### WIRELESS OPERATORS TO HEAR BAND CONCERTS

TACOMA, Wash., Jan. 8.—Wireless telephone operators in this section now hear a special band concert each week, arranged especially for them. The Thirty-first Coast artillery band at Camp Lewis is giving a weekly concert which is carried out into space on the new wireless telephone system recently installed there. Private wireless instruments within a 50-mile radius can hear the concert, it is said, and government instruments as far distant as San Francisco frequently hear a strain of music.

### NEW PROCESS KEEPS STREETS VERY CLEAN

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, Jan. 8.—A solution of the problem of keeping streets clean following a snow storm when snow becomes caked and slippery has been made here with the use of hot sulphur water.

The water is brought into the city from Warm Springs by the tanks used in the summer to sprinkle down the dust. It is then flushed over the slippery roads and within a few minutes the caked snow and ice is melted with rivulets of the melted material flowing into the gutters.

### MANY GENERALS ARE RETIRE ON PAY

ATHENS, Greece, Jan. 8.—Eighteen generals and over 200 colonels have been appointed to the Greek army to replace adherents of former Premier Venizelos. LOS ANGELES, Cal., Jan. 8.—New indictments charging F. Ray Groves, secretary of the Democratic state central committee, Ralph Groves, his brother and Joseph Goldberg with extortion in connection with alleged violations of the prohibition laws, were returned by the federal grand jury here.

### FINISHING TOUCHES ON GOV'T GAS PLANT

FORT WORTH, Texas, Jan. 8.—Finishing touches are being put on the federal government's \$5,000,000 helium gas plant six miles north of Fort Worth, and operations on a large scale are expected to begin soon.

This announcement is made by Lieutenant Griffin, who is in charge as the representative of the navy department. The first of the machinery was shipped to Fort Worth before the first of the year.

Established in 1917 at a cost of \$5,000,000, the plant has been an experimental station thus far. But the worth of the gas and its economy for use by the navy and army balloons have been proved to the satisfaction of military experts.

### THOUSANDS SHRINERS TO MEET IN TACOMA TODAY

TACOMA, Wash., Jan. 8.—Several thousand Shriners from California, Oregon, Nevada, Montana and Utah are expected to assemble here today to do honor to Ellis Lewis Garrett, son, imperial potentate of the Masonic Shrine of North America.

The meeting is scheduled to be one of the most pretentious Shrine sessions yet held with the exception of the annual assemblies of the organization. Numerous bands and parades from the 23 Shrine temples on the Pacific coast will be here.

### ASK REMOVAL HEAD COAST AIR SERVICE

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Jan. 8.—Requests of various San Francisco citizens that Colonel John A. Jones be removed as head of the air mail service on the Pacific coast because of alleged dictatorial and inefficient conduct and having compelled as letters to fly under extremely dangerous conditions, were telegraphed to Attorney General Pound & United States District Attorney Silva today.

### D'ANNUNZIO SENDS FOR HIS WARROBE

### POLICE BARRACKS SCENE OF ATTACK

DUBLIN, Ireland, Jan. 8.—The police barracks at Tramore, County Waterford, in the martial law area, were attacked last evening when a military party which was sent to the relief of the police was ambushed near Tramore. It is officially stated.

After heavy fighting, says the statement, the members of the ambushing party were dispersed, leaving three dead. It is believed, adds the statement, that the attacking force suffered other casualties.

### JAPANESE READY TO DEPART

(By Associated Press)  
BROWNSVILLE, Texas, Jan. 8.—The tension in the lower Rio Grande valley over the arrival of prospective Japanese colonists appeared to have been eased as a result of the promise by two Japanese families at Harlingen to return to California.

Members of the American Legion post at Harlingen pledged their aid in the recovery of \$10,000 which the orientals said they had paid, partly in cash, to Y. Yamada for farming property near Harlingen. Yamada is a Japanese resident of Los Angeles.

### HAS SEVEN SITES FOR DAKOTA DAM

(By Associated Press)  
SIOUX FALLS, S. D., Jan. 8.—South Dakota's hydro-electric dam may be located at any one of seven sites along the 27 1/2 miles of the Missouri river's course from the north to the southern border of the state. This report is made by a corps of engineers who have investigated the possibilities of the river.

The problem of locating the dam promises to be one of the chief questions before the present legislature.

This decision will be pursuant upon action of the 1917 legislature empowering the state to purchase a one and one-half power plant which was approved by the voters in 1918. A hydro-electric commission created by the 1919 legislature reported last spring.

The sites most favored are those at Moberly, about 20 miles from the northern state line, and at the Mulberry farm, an equal distance from the southern border.

It is estimated that the plant will cost around \$20,000,000.

### COST OF LIVING IS \$1.50 DAY IN CHINA

MANILA, P. I., Jan. 8.—The people of the Laming districts of China can be fed for \$1.50—Mexican—each for each person, according to a cablegram received today from Colonel A. H. Wallace, of the signal corps of the United States army, who went to China recently in charge of a shipment of relief supplies carried from Manila on an army transport.

Two shipments of supplies of several hundred tons each have been sent from Manila on army transports and the transport Merritt, leaving in a few days, is expected to carry a large quantity of supplies for the same purpose.

### CRAYER FUNERAL TOMORROW

The funeral of Hugh M. Crayer, who died at the county hospital yesterday morning, will take place from the undertaking parlor of Wynn and A. Cavannah Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Efforts to locate relatives of the deceased have been without avail.

### TARIFF ON LEMONS ASKED

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 8.—A plea for consideration for the ultimate consumer was made by Senator Thomas of Colorado, before the senate finance committee which is holding hearings on the house emergency tariff bill designed to protect farmers. "It strikes me," said Thomas, "that some consideration ought to be given the consumer. Everybody comes here appealing for help. Everybody is in a bad fix. But the result is always the same—stick the consumers!"

K. D. Loos, appearing in behalf of California lemon growers, had asked for a tariff of 100 cents a pound on lemons. Thomas inquired whether or if this was what the growers would have developed a monopoly as a result of having Italian lemons. The witness insisted that no such effect could be expected.

### ARROWHEAD ACTIVE HIGH SALES AT 13

During today's short session the mining market continued active. Broken Hills continues to be a heavy trader. Opening at 49 the price advanced to high sales at 50. Under heavy selling the price declined steadily and toward the close broke quickly to low sales at 35, closing 35 bid, a total of 87,300 shares changing hands. Arrowhead was active with high sales at 13 on a buyer. Divides were heavily traded in. Tonopah Divide selling at 12 1/2. Haxbrouck at 4. Broucher at 12 and Gold Zoo at 25. West opened stronger with high sales at 11. Atin at 4. Kernick at 10 and Victory at 5 were unchanged. Reuters sold high at 6 1/2 and in demand closing at 5 bid.

In the Tonopah, Roscoe-Eula sold off a point at 25. West End sold at 1.05. Crescent continues to show advance, with sales reported at 18.

Goldfields also showed some attention, with Red Hills at 2. Spearhead at 4 and Keweenaw at 2. Silver Dick advanced to sales at 10 cents.

Consolidated Virginia sold at 2.60 and Simon Lead at 60.

The industrial market was firm. Total sales for the day were 429,100 shares.
