LORD MAYOR MUST BE SHIPPED HOME NO PASSPORTS

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 10.—Refusal to waive passport restrictions in the case of Daniel J. O'Callaghan, lord mayor of Cork, who arrived from Ireland last week as a stowaway without a passport, was decided upon by the state department. It was announced that the opinion of the secretary of the state department that there was no reason why an exception should be made in the case of the lord mayor had been concurred in by Assistant Secretary of State Davis in a decision transmitted to Secretary of Labor Wilson.

BIG DROP IN STEEL FOR MONTH

(By Associated Press) NEW YORK, Jan. 10.—The monthly tonnage report of the United States Steel corporation, made public here, showed \$3,148,122 tons of unfilled orders on hand December 31. This is a decrease from last month's unfilled orders, which totaled 9,021,481 tons. This is the largest decrease reported in any month since the reaction began in August last and reduces the unfilled orders of the corporation to the smallest total since November, 1919, when unfilled orders totaled 7,128,339 tons.

LIVELY TRADING WITH LEADERS GOING STRONG

Broken Hills continued to show the lead today during an active market. After closing at 35 Saturday the price opened today at 42, and under steady bidding rose rapidly to sales at 52, when free selling brought the price down to 44, closing 45 bid and sales. A total of 100,800 shares changed hands. Arrowhead also was active. Opening at 12, sharp bidding advanced the price to sales at 15, closing at 14 sales, with a total of 55,000 shares coming out. Divides had a tendency to weakness. Tonopah Divide sold off to 115. Broughton at 13, Dividend at 4 and West at 9 were unchanged. Divide Extension sold higher at 30 cents. East Divide sold at 3. Rosetta weakened off to 4. In the Tonopahs, Rescue sold at 24 on a buyer. Midway sold at 15. Crescent was stronger on sales at 12. Cash Boy, assessment paid, sold at 7. Goldfields received some attention, with Silver Pick at 10, Spearhead at 4 and Lone Star at 4. White Caps, assessment paid, sold at 8. Consolidated Virginia was active with sales from 2.80 to 3.00. Total sales for the day were 390,300 shares.

NO CHANGE FOR PEACE IN IRELAND

(By Associated Press) LONDON, Jan. 10.—Conferences between Rev. Michael O'Flanagan, acting president of the Sinn Fein, and Premier Lloyd George, with a view to bringing about peace in Ireland, have been broken off and will not be resumed, says the Daily Mail. Before O'Flanagan returned to Ireland he had a long conversation with the premier and the outcome is said to be described in official quarters as "not as satisfactory as could be expected."

CLUBBING CUBA TO BREAK THE BRITISH CONTROL OF CABLES

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 10.—Charges that the state department is "making threats against the Cuban government" to prevent the issuance of permits for Western Union cable landings on the island were made before the senate committee by Newton Carlton, president of the Western Union. Carlton declared the department was "pushing to a point of persecution" its difference with the company over an attempt to land a cable from Barbadoes, which he said would establish a new line of communication with South America. Questioned as to the alleged suppression by the English authorities of official dispatches sent from Washington to American diplomatic representatives in Great Britain, Carlton refused to answer categorically because that would make trouble. Acting Secretary Davis denied before the senate that the state department had brought any pressure to bear on the Cuban government to prevent landing of the Western Union Barbadoes cable as had been charged earlier in the day by President Carlton of the Western Union.

BONANZA GOLD REPORTED FROM THE SILVER PICK

According to reports from Goldfield, the Silver Pick Con. has picked up the old ore shoot in the abandoned workings of the Red Top and is displaying four faces of ore that runs from three to nine ounces gold per ton. Matt Murphy, the superintendent is elated, as he always maintained that highgrade in quantities would be found in the Red Top, on which the Silver Pick has a lease. This is a Zadic property with an assessment due January 15. It is said that the ore can be mined, shipped and treated at the Millers plant for not to exceed \$5 per ton. Old timers are engaged in figuring the possibilities of the ore shoot and their guesses hazard anywhere from \$100,000 to a half-million dollars. The ore shoot is in the caved workings of the Red Top which fell in 1914 before the boom reached the southern camp. At the time of the disaster the workmen had to flee for their lives, dropping their drills and mackinacks without ceremony, and the steps was abandoned. The section adjoins the Silver Pick from which it is reached through a long crosscut.

SAVING NATION'S BEAUTY SPOTS

(By Associated Press) DES MOINES, Iowa, Jan. 10.—For the first time since park creation became a public question, leaders in the movement to preserve America's beauty spots as centers of recreation, health and education began to gather yesterday for a national conference. Virtually every state will have representatives present when Governor W. L. Harding welcomes them to Iowa at the opening session today. The federal government will be represented by Stephen T. Mathers, director of the national park service, who will respond to Governor Harding's greeting.

PAN AMERICAN LABOR MEETING

(By Associated Press) MEXICO CITY, Jan. 10.—Delegates from labor organizations of the United States, Mexico and 16 South and Central American republics are here for the opening of the third Pan-American Federation of Labor conference. Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, with 14 other representatives of American labor, made up the delegation from the United States.

B. P. O. E. GOING 200 STRONG TO ESCORT J. GORI

Tonopah lodge, B. P. O. E., is going to give Goldfield Edge a royal time on the occasion of the formal visit of Joseph E. Gori, deputy grand exalted ruler for the state of Nevada, which occurs next Thursday. STORMS SWEEP FROM PACIFIC

(By Associated Press) SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Jan. 10.—Two storms on the Pacific, one off the California coast and the other between Sitka and Alaska, necessitated the posting of storm warnings from San Francisco north by the weather bureau and the issuance of special warnings against strong head winds to shipping out of Puget sound points. Freezing temperatures were general last night throughout the state, some figures being Porterville 20, Paso Robles 31, Oroville and Orland 31, and Merced 29. Freezing temperatures are expected again tonight.

NO AMENDMENT TO ALIEN LAWS

(By Associated Press) SACRAMENTO, Cal., Jan. 10.—The assembly of the California legislature adopted unanimously without reference to committee Senator Inman's resolution asking that no treaty be made with Japan granting citizenship to Japanese or to nullify provisions of the new anti-alien land law. The adoption makes the resolution the first measure to pass both houses of the legislature.

SKIDS TO DEATH ON WET STREET

(By Associated Press) LOS ANGELES, Cal., Jan. 10.—A body found under an overturned automobile here is said by the police to have been identified as that of Raymond C. Thorne, member of the crew of Montgomery Ward & Thrift of Chicago. The man apparently had been riding on top of the machine. The police concluded that it decided on the pavement made dangerous by heavy showers had overturned and threw the man beneath it.

ROADS RECREANT TO LABOR MEN

(By Associated Press) CHICAGO, Jan. 10.—The railroads have broken faith with the public, according to charges made at the opening of the hearing by the railway labor board under demands of the railroad brotherhoods that national boards of adjustment should be re-constituted. The charges were made by H. M. Jewell, president of the railway employees' department of the American Federation of Labor.

MINER SUCCEUMBS AT THE HOSPITAL

Joseph Gribben, aged 46, a Cornishman by birth, died at the Mine Operators' hospital this morning at 2 o'clock from Bright's disease. Deceased was employed at the Belmont, Ky. comparatively short time, and nothing is known of his family. His identification card on file at the mine operators' states that he has no family and that in the event of accident that his insurance go to my wife. Gribben gave his last professional place of employment as Ryan, headquarters at the horax company in Death Valley. Gribben had been in the hospital since December 21. He was admitted with the wish of the dead man, Ray W. Perry, public administrator, took charge of the estate this morning and arranged for the funeral to be held Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock from the undertaking parlors.

HARDING TURNS IN RESIGNATION

(By Associated Press) MARION, Ohio, Jan. 10.—With his resignation as senator effective on January 15 on the desk of Harry L. Davis, the incoming governor of Ohio, President-elect Harding was looking forward to six weeks as a private citizen before taking up the responsibilities of the presidency. Another Democrat, William G. Sharp, former ambassador to France, was called into conference by Mr. Harding on the plan for an association of nations.

NEW YORK BIDDING FOR CRESCENT STOCK

MacNamara Crescent shot into prominence this morning when buying orders from New York caused the quotation to rise from 5 to 12 cents in the course of an hour. The Crescent is regarded as one of the great possibilities of the western side of the Tonopah district, where the work is going on through a long crosscut that was projected to extend a distance of 2000 feet in a southeasterly and northwesterly direction. This is one of the companies organized by Joe Josephs and is well financed by the Grimes and Silver Divide companies which took over a large block of the Crescent stock when the company was organized.

TONOPAH BRIDE COMING FROM THE PHILIPPINES

Lieutenant Donald F. Carroll and his bride, formerly Miss Helen Caswell, have sailed from Manila to Honolulu where Lieutenant Carroll will join his old regiment, the Twenty-seventh United States Infantry, after having served on staff duty in the Philippines. The couple sailed from Manila December 15 on the steamer port Thomas. Mrs. Carroll expects to visit her father, Captain Albans Case, in Tonopah by February 15, according to a letter received by the captain this morning.

GOLD SHOWING IN THE ROSETTA DIVIDE

Ernest Kiehofer brought in a 25-pound sample of quartz from a face of nine feet on the Rosetta Divide Saturday morning, and in the evening received returns giving values of \$27.95, of which \$2.95 was in silver. The sample was taken from the ledge opened by the crosscut at a distance of 600 feet from the shaft where a drift was started under the direction of Dave Murphy superintendent. This drift is four feet wide and the face is all in ore. Samples taken Saturday gave gold content of \$26.90 and 10 cents in silver. At a distance of 500 feet from the shaft another promising looking ledge was cut and a drift extended for 20 feet, with assays giving \$11 in gold. The formation here is very encouraging. The crew softened off today after the remarkable advance of 500 per cent in two days and sales were made at 4 cents. WALTER ST.
