SISTERS OF CHARITY WORKING IN CHINA

(By Associated Press) KAIPENG, Honan Province, China, Jan. 15.—The first group of Sisters of Charity to come to China, a party of six, who are members of the Order of Divine Providence, and come from St. Marys-in-the-Woods, Indiana, have arrived to establish a mission of the order and open schools in Honan.

The six sisters were chosen from 26 who had volunteered for service in the far east. They have arrived in China just 10 years after the first sisters of the order came from France to America.

A number of day and boarding schools and a high school for Chinese girls will be opened by the sisters in the coming year. A dispensary also will be opened by Sister Mary Elise, who is a qualified pharmacist.

OUR CHARGE \$7.50

SECTION 1.—All foreign corporations doing business in the State of Nevada shall, not later than the month of March in each year, beginning in the year 1914, publish a statement of their last year's business in some newspaper published in the State of Nevada. If published in a daily newspaper, such statement shall be published for a period of one week; or if published in a semi-weekly or tri-weekly newspaper, for a period of two weeks; or if published in a weekly newspaper for a period of four weeks.

SECTION 2.—The secretary of the company publishing the statement shall file a copy with the assessor of each county of the State of Nevada, in which said company is doing business.

SECTION 3.—Any district attorney in the state is competent to sue to recover the penalty, or the attorney general. The first county suing through its district attorney shall secure the penalty, and if no suit is brought for the penalty by any district the State shall have the right to recover through its attorney general.

The TONOPAH DAILY BONANZA will make publication required by law, which includes the filing of a sworn affidavit of publication with the assessor of each of the counties of the State, within which the company is doing business; an affidavit of publication will also be furnished secretaries.
