



PRESIDENTIAL ELECTORS FOR NEVADA

In the center of the group is Miss Belle Boyd of Reno, who was a delegate to the national Republican convention at Chicago last year. She received the highest vote of any Nevada candidate at the general election of 1920, barring that cast by R. P. Currier of Elko, for regent of the state university, who was unopposed. She was selected by her two compatriots as official messenger to carry the vote of her state to Washington, and so far as has been learned is the only woman in the United States to be thus honored.

RED CROSS OPENS KITCHEN IN CITY OF BUDAPEST

(By Associated Press) BUDAPEST, Jan. 31.—An American Red Cross kitchen has been opened here to feed 50,000 children, the misery among adults, according to Captain Pedlow of the Red Cross, surpasses even that of Vienna.

They hide their suffering through pride and they revolt at the idea of asking help from foreigners, Captain Pedlow said. "To help them we must conceal the charitable aspect of the work."

I have seen much poverty but never anything like that of Budapest. In Vienna, he said, American and other foreign aid had brought some relief while virtually nothing had been done by the outside world here.

NEW JAP BATTLESHIP DEVELOPS SOME SPEED

TOKYO, Jan. 31.—Japan's latest battleship, Nagato, has a deadweight tonnage of 33,800, and can develop a speed of 23 knots per hour. Her length is 689 feet. The armament of the new addition to the Japanese fleet includes eight 15-inch guns and 20 6-inch guns. She is fitted with four turbine engines. The Nagato takes a place among the largest battleships afloat today, her 33,800 tons comparing with the British "Hood," 41,000 tons, and the American "Tennessee," 32,000 tons.

LABOR FACTOR FOR HONOLULU LEGISLATURE

(By Associated Press) HONOLULU, T. H., Jan. 31.—Labor legislation promises to play a prominent part in the territorial legislature which opens here February 16.

A number of bills fathered by the central labor council of Honolulu, the ideas of which were presented to candidates and voters at the November election, are now being prepared. One would make it a misdemeanor to coerce or compel any person to join a labor organization. Another would limit the use of restraining orders and injunctions as applied to labor disputes. A third would ban blacklisting during strikes.

Aid for the sugar industry, Hawaii's leading money producer, likely will be sought in a measure which would propose to increase the efficiency of small planters by giving them assistance of sugar experts. At present, there is one territorial sugar expert and his work is said to be such a success that a plan to give him a corps of aides on each island is finding strong backing.

Establishment of a domestic relations court in Honolulu and revision of the present systems of dental and medical examination for territorial certificates are also among the possibilities when the legislature meets.

VICTORIA DAIRYMEN ANNUAL CONVENTION

(By Associated Press) VICTORIA, B. C., Jan. 31.—British Columbia stock breeders, seed growers and dairymen will meet in conventions here next month.

The first meeting will be that of the British Columbia Dairymen's association February 8 and 9. On February 10 and 11 the Stock Breeders' association and Seed Growers' association will hold a joint meeting.
