## GUSMAN TRIAL IS CALLED TODAY IN DISTRICT COURT

The case of the state of Nevada vs. Trinidad Gusman, who is charged with assault on the life of Fred Wellbrook on August 11, 1920, was called in the district court this morning, Judge Mark Averill presiding.

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It will be remembered that on the morning of August 11, about 2 a. m., Gusman entered the Cottage cabaret in the redlight district of this city, and threatened to shoot one of the girls employed at the cabaret, and when Wellbrook interfered, Gusman turned the gun on him.

Gusman was overpowered by other persons in the cabaret and was held until the arrival of the police. Wellbrook received one shot in the body and one in the right arm, and for a time was in a precarious condition. He is now partially paralyzed. Wellbrook made the following statement after the shooting in the presence of Dr. McLeod, Harry H. Atkinson and Jack Grant:

"I hereby give the following statement regarding the shooting in the Cottage cabaret which occurred about 2 a. m. August 11:

"I was sitting in the back room directly back of the dance floor with Bobbie Patterson and another woman when Trinidad Gusman rushed in with a gun in his hand and threatened to shoot. I jumped up and sprang between them, trying to protect the other woman, when Gusman threatened to shoot me through the head and he fired twice, shooting me through the right arm and the right side of my chest. Before Gusman came into the room we heard a shot outside of the building. I never talked to the Mexican or had any trouble with him.

## DISPATCH SAYS TROTZKY QUITS

By Associated Press: LONDON, Jan. 31.—A Moscow wireless dispatch reports that Leon Trozky has resigned the position of commissary for communications and has been replaced by M. Yemshanyov.

At the recent congress of soviets, Trozky said the condition of Russian railways was terrible. The number of broken-down locomotives and cars was growing, and repairs were in a chaotic state.

He said repairs on locomotives were difficult because there were over 100 different types and it was difficult to collect the spare parts. He advocated no more than seven types of locomotives and suggested mass production.

"In order to begin our socialist economy system," he said, "we must sweep out all this monstrous motley of technical and rule-of-thumb chaos which remains to us from the past by means of standardization."

## SHOW A RUPTURE IN DIPLOMATIC TERMS

By Associated Press: THE HAGUE, Jan. 31.—The rupture of diplomatic relations between Holland and Jugo-Slavia has resulted in the virtual prohibition of travel of Dutchmen in Serbia. The Jugo-Slav government has announced it will not grant visas to Hollanders.

The break occurred over alleged mistreatment of M. Rappaport, an Austrian subject, who was Dutch consul at Belgrade during the war. The Serbians contended he was an enemy subject, unfriendly, and in effect, a spy.

## DOPE PEDDLER IS AGAIN IN TOILS

Tom Fong, who just can't make himself behave, was arrested again last Saturday night about 9 o'clock by Deputy Sheriff Gillan and Officer Smith. Fong was released on \$1000 bonds Saturday morning in the justice court on a charge of disobeying the narcotic law. Scarcely had he gained his freedom than he started playing his trade in satisfying his numerous customers with the drug that cheers. Saturday evening Gillan and Smith noticed Fong acting in a queer manner, and upon investigation found upon his person three bottles of morphine, cocaine and heroin, also a quantity of cube morphine. Several small packages of the drug were found to be wrapped ready for sale to prospective customers.

Two months ago Fong was arrested by federal agents, who found about \$2000 worth of drugs in his possession. He was placed under a \$2000 cash bond, which he furnished. Friday night Deputy Sheriff, Gillan and Smith caught Fong with several hundred dollars worth of drugs in his possession. He was released by Justice Cuddy upon producing \$1000 cash bail.

Fong should be given the final jail sentence, as he has disregarded laws on the statute books for a long time and is a character that Tonopah will be glad to get rid of. In all probability the federal charge will be pressed first and after that the two charges placed by the local officers.

## WOMEN OF CHINA TO WEAR SHORT SKIRTS

By Associated Press: SHANGHAI, Jan. 31.—Even the Chinese women have come in for criticism for wearing short skirts and also for displaying their arms. This criticism applies, however, only to those who have adopted foreign styles of dress.

An edict against the wearing of these styles has been issued by the city magistrate and chief of police of Shanghai. It declares that these fashions make the wearer neither foreign nor Chinese, and adds: "Wearers are devoid of shame and frequent public streets without embarrassment. In future all so offending will be arrested and fined."
