

PORTLAND, ORE. IS OVERRUN BY UNEMPLOYED

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 18.—The unemployment situation in Portland has become so acute that there are now more than 2000 bread winners jobless and penniless. The Portland city council and Multnomah county commissioners have authorized Portland post No. 1 of the American Legion to take the situation in hand in order that a more serious condition may be averted.

ONLY TWO SHIPS TO BE LAUNCHED

SHANGHAI, Feb. 18.—Only two of the fleet of 34 steamers contracted for to the far east by the United States shipping board now remain to be launched and to supervise this final work which is being carried out at Shanghai the shipping board's far eastern headquarters have been transferred from Japan to Shanghai.

The other four contracted for in China are the largest steamers ever built in China. The four are sister ships, each 10,500 tons and 129 feet in length. The first, the Mandarin, was launched last June, and the second, the Celestial, was launched in August. It is planned to launch the third boat, the Oriental, late this month and the last, the Cathay, in April. These boats are being built in the Kiangnan Dock & Engineering Company of Shanghai.

CAMP LEWIS TO HAVE FOOTBALL TEAM

TACOMA, Wash., Feb. 18.—Camp Lewis Tacoma, will be home of the first football team of the Ninth Corps Area, which comprises all the western states. Major General C. H. May, commander at Camp Lewis, has been authorized to draw upon any military organizations in the Corps for football players. Games with the Pacific fleet and Washington State college already have been arranged for 1921.

CANADA PREMIER RECEIVES HONOR

HONOLULU, T. H., Feb. 18.—Hon. Arthur Meighen, premier of Canada, has accepted the honorary presidency of the Pan-Pacific union, according to a recent announcement at the headquarters of the union in Honolulu. Premier Meighen succeeds Sir Robert Borden, former prime minister of Canada, in the Pan-Pacific position.

TURKISH SOVIETS HOLD CONVENTION

LONDON, Feb. 18.—A second congress of the young bolsheviks of Turkoystan was recently held at Tashkent with 182 delegates, representing 310 organizations, with a total membership of more than 20,000 Young Musulmans and Russians, says a wireless dispatch from Moscow.
