

CHEMICAL PLANT A NEW STATE INDUSTRY

A new industry which means much to Nevada has been located at Winnemucca. This is the Silver State Chemical company, which has commenced the construction of a 100-ton daily capacity ore treating plant, using the chemical leaching process. The capacity of the plant will be increased as rapidly as possible by the construction of other units until it is handling a large part of the ore mined in northern Nevada.

The management of the company is composed of the leading bankers, merchants and mining men of the state, all of whom are enthusiastic regarding the new enterprise and the good it will do for the mining industry of the state.

A large site for the buildings has been purchased on the outskirts of Winnemucca, fronting on the Southern Pacific tracks, and active work was commenced several weeks ago toward the construction of the first unit. Considerable money has been raised in Winnemucca and neighboring towns so that the completion of this unit is assured. Large quantities of ore are being contracted in various sections, thus making certain that the plant will have ample material on which to operate. Inquiries are being received from all parts of the United States by the company for the products which they will manufacture, so that a ready market seems assured.

The process to be used by this plant is not a new one, except for some formulas which have been developed by the company's chemist. Plants using this same process have been operating for a number of years in the east and are successfully treating ores and turning them into finished products instead of into waste. Germany has been turning out dye-stuffs by this method for the past generation but the industry has not been carried on to any great extent in this country until the past few years.

The metals in the ore directly into commercial products. The lead is turned into white lead, and chrome lead for paints, the iron is made into Prussian blue, used as a dye-stuff for coloring paints, and is made into ink. Mercury from the cinnabar ore is made into French vermilion, a valuable dye. Zinc, antimony and copper also make fine dyes.

One unit of the plant will be devoted to the manufacture of chemicals, part of which will be used in the treatment of ores and the rest marketed. Tungsten will be made into sodium tungstate and tungsten steel for automobiles, fine tools and machinery.

The various non-metallic ores will be treated by the plant and made into products which are in great demand. Talc will be prepared for talcum powder and tire talc; barium will be made into barium sulphate for use in manufacturing automobile tires; calcite will be ground into whiting from which putty is made. Other non-metallic ores to be treated include gypsum, sulphur, ochre, lime and the diatomaceous earths. In fact, it is understood that the plant will be equipped, when completed, to treat all the various kinds of ore found in Nevada.

It would seem as though this industry is what Nevada has needed for many years, furnishing as it will a ready market for the lower grades of ores which will not return a profit to the miner when shipped long distances to a smelter. From what we understand of the enterprise the miner will realize larger returns from his ore and will not be subject to the penalties and other charges which now tend to reduce his returns. The mining industry should certainly be stimulated wherever the effects of this plant are felt, and the new money which should be put into circulation, business of every kind should profit from its operation.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

To Secretaries of Corporations Doing Business in Nevada But Incorporated in Other States
OUR CHARGE \$7.50

SECTION 1.—All foreign corporations doing business in the State of Nevada shall, not later than the month of March in each year, beginning in the year 1914, publish a statement of their last year's business in some newspaper published in the State of Nevada. If published in a daily newspaper, such statement shall be published for a period of one week, or if published in a semi-weekly or tri-weekly newspaper, for a period of two weeks; or if published in a weekly newspaper for a period of four weeks.
 SECTION 2.—The secretary of the company publishing the statement shall file a copy with the assessor of each county of the State of Nevada, in which said company is doing business.
 SECTION 3.—Any district attorney in the state is competent to sue to recover the penalty, or the attorney general. The first county suing through its district attorney shall secure the penalty, and if no suit is brought for the penalty by any district the State shall have the right to recover through its attorney-general.

The TONOPAH DAILY BONANZA will make publication required by law, which includes the filing of a sworn affidavit of publication with the assessor of each of the counties of the State, within which the company is doing business; an affidavit of publication will also be furnished secretaries.
