OIL RUSH IS ON IN UTAH

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, March 29. Approximately 7,000,000 acres of government lands in Utah thus far have been covered by applications for oil prospecting permits. These applications number about 2300, while not more than 200 have been granted.

The greater portion of the 5,000,000 acres withdrawn by the government in 1911 as naval oil reserves have been filed upon, while the additional acreage represents what also is considered promising oil territory. The lands involved extend, with some interruptions, from the Wyoming-Utah line at the north to the Arizona line at the south and form a strip of about 40 miles wide on the eastern side of the state. At the beginning of the activity the principal point was what is known as the San Rafael swell, lying principally in Emery county and extending southward in Wayne county. This structure, which is approximately 40 miles in length, is declared by geologists to be the largest structure thus far discovered in the world.

The Circle Cliffs structure, also immense, and located in Garfield county, next experienced a rush of applications, and this was followed by the prospective fields of San Juan county, in the extreme southwestern section of the state. The latest district to receive attention is the Nequios anticline, in the eastern portions of Emery and Wayne counties, and which is said to be almost as large a structure as the San Rafael swell.

In practically all of the districts mentioned oil was developed to a minor extent at shallow depth from 15 to 20 years ago. Practically all of the larger oil producing concerns of the county are represented by applications for leases, but thus far only one, the Ohio Oil company, has started drilling operations. This company has three rigs at work on holdings in Emery, Wayne and Garfield counties.
