CORK, April 5.—The Cork Examiner has notified its readers that everything appearing in its editorial and news columns is liable to military censorship. Announcement has been made also at Wexford, which like Cork is in the martial law area, that the proprietors of the Free Press and The People have been notified by the military authorities that before going to press the contents of the papers must be submitted for censorship and passed for publication.

Before martial law was instituted a more or less unofficial censorship was imposed by the military or police in several towns in the east and west.

JUSTICE AND JURIES

Recent acquittal at Matewan, West Virginia, of 16 men charged with the slaying of several deputies who were being used in a coal strike has an echo in the passage by the state legislature of a measure which provides that jurors may be called from other counties to sit in important cases. It seems probable that the legislature saw in the Matewan verdict a fear on the part of the jurors to return a verdict in keeping with the evidence. The bill provides that the presiding judge may call citizens from other counties in case of difficulty in obtaining a jury, or if he feels that justice would not be served by using a jury of persons who might be influenced by local conditions in arriving at a verdict.

In a number of states transferring cases to other counties for trial has been found to expedite the ends of justice. In the West Virginia experiment it will probably be found that the same feeling that makes it difficult to obtain a jury will probably operate to prevent a fair verdict.

A change of venue to another county removes the trial from the atmosphere of prejudice that is created whenever a sensational case is tried in a county. The bitterness that had been aroused at Matewan made it practically impossible to impanel a jury that would be willing to return a verdict that might involve the safety of its members. Any state could well afford to pay the costs of taking witnesses to a county remote from the scene of a crime if by so doing a verdict could be rendered free from the influence that surrounds a case where feeling is high as it was in the case of the mining troubles in Mingo and other counties of West Virginia.

THAT FRACTIONAL COIN

Recent advocacy of the coinage of a 2 1/2-cent coin in the papers has received the endorsement of the Fourth Estate, newspaper trade publication of New York, which brings out some sound arguments in favor of such a coin.

A 2 1/2-cent piece would be far more useful than the proposed 2-cent coin which would save nobody anything and would be little more than an added coin to be confused in the pocket or in dim light with a nickel.

But a half-nickel would be a bird of another plumage. It would fit our scheme of government taxation and have its place in the bargain tables of department stores. In many a transaction the taxpayer or the store pays an extra half-cent. There is no good reason why this should be paid the extra half-cent would be added to the individual by coinage of a halfnickel, which would be far more practical than either the proposed 2-cent piece or the same coin with a half-cent coin.

A RECKLESS FRENCHMAN


The statement of a French senator that the United States has never repaid a loan obtained from the king of France in 1778 was ill-advised; the disregard of evidence in regard to the truth of the assertion, and the incident will be seized upon and exploited by those desirous of fomenting bad feeling between the two nations. Already expressions of indignation are arising from Americans who rashly assume that the senator speaks for France, and that France is seeking a pretext to evade payment of her war debt to the United States.

It is reassuring to learn that some Frenchmen realize the unwisdom of discussing the subject in the spirit shown by the senator. One of his colleagues, for example, replied to him as follows: "I must ask pardon, but it would be dangerous for the good relations which it is indispensable to maintain with the United States to open such a discussion if really this debt has been paid."

There are in this country persons who would be delighted to have a strain placed on the friendship between the United States and France. Some of them deliberately and openly tried to foster ill feeling against our ally not long since by holding a meeting in New York at which the French soldiers were accused of atrocities against Germans. French politicians are shortsighted indeed if they, unwittingly or not, set these propagandists by expressing sentiments that are apt to cause irritation in the United States.
