

For the Easter Wedding



IT IS a good thing that weddings prove inspiring to designers, for, on all occasions, they demand most at the hands of milliners. But outfitting a wedding procession is pure joy to artistic souls. Here they may be as picturesque as they please; no other hats give them so much latitude in the choice of style and use of color; none are so advantageously placed. The hats from which the mother and other relatives of the bride are to make their choice must provide distinction and brilliance in headwear.

For the Easter wedding this year, the array of hats is very literally brilliant. Millinery fabrics and novelties have multiplied opportunities for the designers, and their imaginations fairly dance to the music of novel materials and of ribbons, laces, flowers.

In the group of four hats pictured there are two that will make a good choice for the mother of the bride or any other of her maternally relatives, who are on the sunny side of sixty. One of them, at the top of the group, is of brilliant black straw with a dangling fringe of cellophane ornaments about the brim edge. This is a

chic and somewhat daring model, with a vivid rose posed at the front, exactly suited to the poise of a modern mother. Just below it at the right appears a hat of shiny, cellophane braid with round crown and sash of cire ribbon. This braid is shown in several colors and is very handsome in gray or the darker shades as navy and brown. A short wreath of flowers, extending from the side crown to the under brim, adds a color note that is lovely with these bright braids.

The lovely bell-crowned hat of hair braid at the left ought to rejoice the heart of any fair bridesmaid. It is shown in light colors with border of ribbon about the brim-edge and sash ends at the back. A little rose set in foliage is posed at the front. But if maids or maids of honor have set their hearts upon something distinctly of this season, the cellophane hat with face edge, all in brown, and border of pink roses, will enthrall them.

POLYNESIAN TONGUE FATHER OF GREEK

 HONOLULU, T. H., April 8.—The Polynesian tongue, of which Hawaiian is a branch, is the father of ancient Greek and Latin and of the modern European languages, according to conclusions reached by J. McMillan Brown, philologist of Canterbury college, Christchurch, New Zealand, whose researches have been made public here through the Bishop museum of Honolulu.

There is a wealth of affinity between the words and the roots of the Polynesian tongue and the primeval Aryan, says Professor Brown, and the conclusion almost is inevitable, he adds, that Polynesian came from Europe many thousands of years ago.

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RICKARD SEES PASSING OF THE PROSPECTORS

 PORTLAND, Ore., April 8.—Old-time prospectors, essentially the products of the frontier, are becoming scarce. T. A. Rickard, editor of a San Francisco mining publication, declared in a talk here last night before the third International Mining congress. The wireless telegraph, the prohibition law, new land acts and railroad grants all have helped the "sourdough" prospector off the world mining stage, he declared.

A plea for the well-tried pick was made by Mr. Rickard. "I am prepared to believe honest scientific investigation will devise a way of obtaining guidance for miners by detecting and measuring the emanations, resistances and other intangible reactions of matter on matter to indicate presence of ore underground," he said. "Meanwhile, it remains for prospectors to use methods on which he can rely, rather than waste time and break his heart on schemes either fraudulent or incoherent. The core-drill and the diamond bit are well-tried tools; the shaft and prospect hole will not deceive; after all the best instrument of divination is the pick. There is an intelligent curiosity in the point of it; there is strength in the handle of it; there is strength in the handle of it. Do not be too readily persuaded to discard it for new-fangled tools of exploration."

Describing the passing of the prospector, Mr. Rickard said that first of all most of the easily-found rich lodes have been located and large low-grade deposits for which mining engineers are seeking today are un-

attractive to the prospector because he cannot work them himself.

"In the old days the prospector could count on discovering ore so rich that he could realize on it," Mr. Rickard added. "If he needed a little capital he got it from the local merchant or saloonkeeper.

"The kind of man that makes a good prospector is becoming rare because he was essentially the product of the frontier; he was physically strong, self-reliant, adventurous and optimistic. He hated to work for wages, because he loved independence; so he roamed the unexplored wilderness with a quiet hand. Now his successor cares less for the solitude and more for the hectic life of the noisy city.

"Moreover, the unknown possibilities of discovery beyond the frontier have retreated from centers of population. The wireless has extended its invisible tentacles into remote parts of the wilderness. Any discovery is blazoned in the press immediately, bringing a mob of pseudo-prospectors and speculators who plaster the ground with notices of location. The prospector finds the mining law fails to protect his ground, he may be in conflict with cattlemen or may be told he has located on railroad land.

"Moreover, they have taken his whiskey from him and this is no joke. It was his one relaxation, the crown of his emotional life. To the old-timer a bottle of whiskey was as essential as a pick and a hammer. The eighteenth amendment to him is a rank injustice; he is ready to quit and he does. And what becomes of him, I do not know."

PRESIDENT GETS A SPECIAL BED

PECULIAR DEGREES AT ALBERTA U.

 EDMONTON, Alberta, April 8.—Such degrees as "Doctor of Cheese-making" and "Bachelor of Butter-churning" may be conferred upon graduates of the University of Alberta. A professorship in butter and cheese making has been added to the faculty. The post has been tendered to C. P. Marker, provincial dairy commissioner, whose achievements have given him an international reputation in scientific dairying.

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
