"ZOUAVE"

PRIOR to the World war, one of the most dreaded branches of the French army was the Zouaves, a corps which was famous for its reckless bravery and fearless courage as it was conspicuous by reason of the bright red and very baggy trousers which it wore. The progress of military science and the great arm-ies in the range of modern life, rendered the red uniform a target for all sharpshooters, so the scarlet trousers had to be replaced by a less conspicuous attire.

But the Zouaves, as a corps, continued to live up to their reputation for daring—a reputation responsible for their name, a somewhat more civilized rendering of the title-name of the Zouaves, an extremely warlike nation in Africa. The first levy of Zouaves was raised in 1830 by General Clauzel and was originally composed of native African soldiers with French officers. Gradually, the natives were displaced by adventurous Frenchmen and, in 1841, the corps consisted of three battalions—each one of which has carved a niche for itself in the Parisian hall of fame.

TURKISH JOAN OF ARC FORMS FEMALE ARMY

ANGORA, Turkey, July 12.—A Turkish Joan of Arc, Aishe Hanum, has started a woman's fighting brigade against the Greeks. Her organization, called the Kain brigade, has already taken part in active fighting and she is constantly enrolling new recruits.

This is the first time in Turkish history that a woman has been so militantly active. She has been dubbed by the people of Anatolia "The Conqueror." Her personality is in distinct contrast to the beautiful Halide Edib Hanum, the writer and graduate of the American Constantinople college, who has been so active in Nationalist politics for two years and fled to the interior in March, 1920, to escape imprisonment by the allies.

Aishe Hanum is a stern, dark woman of the soil, aged 52, who sees visions and believes she is inspired by the Prophet. She wears a veil but has cast aside skirts. She carries a rifle and when not at the front goes through the villages accompanied by her 15-year-old son, urging the peasants to contribute food and money and their able-bodied women to cast out the enemy stranger from the homeland.

As Nationalist soldiers, the uniform of the Kain brigade corresponds to that of its leader.

Indirectly, Aishe Hanum is doing as much as Halide Hanum to emancipate the Turkish woman. When she began her work, the Turkish men, who dislike to have women interfere in politics, tried to force her to return to her farm. But, by the courage born of her visions, Aishe Hanum has continued until she is recognized as an aid to the Nationalist cause.

was woven round with all the romance of adventure, wealth and international strife. Then, through greed and indiscriminate methods of slaughter practiced by some of the soldiers, the industry declined, the seals all but disappeared and their capture was made illegal.

Last year, it was estimated, the waters of the west coast of Washington produced 1,800 animals. Officers in charge of the industry and its control claim that the North Pacific herd which once contained as many as 2,500,000 fur seals, will increase rapidly. It is believed to be probable that 100,000 animals may be taken each year, the catch to be made up wholly of surplus males selected with reference to their economic value, and Canada may ultimately receive in the neighborhood of \$500,000 annually from the seal fisheries.

Then the heart of little Wooden Boy went pit-a-pat and he grew quite bold. "We are equal now," he said, "don't you think we might get married?"


"Of course, silly Boy," answered Girl-Doll, "that was why I came down."
